

### Revd Sue Hart



I am writing this letter at the beginning of Advent 2024. What with one thing and another, I fear if I don't begin to write it now, it won't get written at all. It's a strange thing to be skipping forward a few months, skating through Advent, barely acknowledging Christmas and completely ignoring New Year!

But, is that really so different to how we are prone to living our lives anyway? How often are we actually in the present moment, fully aware of the here and now, alert to the sounds, sights, smells and feels of the specific time and space we occupy in any given moment? Our minds seem to have minds of their own. While we might be having a conversation, taking a walk, praying, our minds are invariably elsewhere, thinking about what we need to do next, what we should have done previously, or, what we wished we were doing instead.

The explosion in mindfulness that has happened over recent years is, partly, in response to our inability as human beings to Be Here Now (I hate quoting Oasis, but they got this right at least!); it is also a response to an epidemic of mental ill-health that has overtaken so many of us. While mindfulness is helpful for many people, I wonder if sometimes the modern-day focus on 'self-care' can serve to mask the fact that so much of what is causing distress and grief in our society – particularly among young people – is systemic rather than personal. There is increasing acknowledgement that depression and anxiety are often symptoms of unmanageable stress caused by external factors such as poverty, homelessness, or a poor environment. Under such circumstances, it is doubtful whether self-care alone can provide real, fundamental answers to life's challenges.

While I am a strong advocate for mindfulness, and know personally how helpful it can be, as a Christian, I do not believe it is enough. People are designed for relationship with each other, and it is often within community connection that people find the deepest healing and liberation from the things that limit their ability to flourish.

Recently I watched an episode of 'Dogs Behaving Very Badly', and found it to be great TV, and not just because I am a dog lover, but because of the heartwarming connection formed between the dog trainer and the person whose dog was behaving very badly. It wasn't just that the trainer fixed the problem, it was the fact they seemed genuinely interested in the person they were helping; they listened non-judgementally while offering understanding, kindness and connection.

Connection or 'communion' is at the heart of the Christian church. We believe that however fractured a person or situation, connection with a community that is grounded in love for God and each other, can help to remind us that we are worth something; we are loved and valuable, and that each of us, even in the face of what can seem insurmountable societal problems, have the ability to live rich and satisfying lives through relationship with each other.

The church is far from perfect, and in the Church of England we have had cause to hold up our hands in shame recently for mistakes made in the past, but there is still something uniquely wonderful about a group of disparate people, inspired by love, trying to make a difference in the world – stumbling, failing often – by simply being together, accepting each other, offering friendship and maybe a helping hand when needed.

If any of this has piqued your interest, but perhaps you're not a particularly 'churchy' person, you might like to explore a new 'para-church' community that is due to begin shortly in the local area. Drawing on Franciscan spirituality and firmly grounded in nature, short Franciscan half-days throughout the year aim to build a community based around walking, talking and eating! 

### History of the Hill & Valley area in Ten Objects

### 1 - Woodcott Churchyard Wall



A subtle one. The photo shows the very skilled joint between the old churchyard wall, alongside the road, and the new, built when Woodcott churchyard was extended. The original wall, with the white efflorescence and yellow lichen patches, was built in 1850 by the Earl of Carnarvon's master bricklayer, George Criswick. When the churchyard was extended in 1925 on land granted by the Carnarvon estate, the new boundary wall was so expertly added, presumably using bricks also from the estate's brickworks in Whitway, that the joint is hardly visible. The new work has weathered well, celebrating its centenary this year. *MC*



### **Parish Council Activities**

The Parish Council held its first meeting of the year on Tuesday January 14<sup>th</sup>, and not surprisingly **Southern Water** and their continuing efforts to find long term solutions for

drainage along the valley was a major item for discussion. The road closure by the Bourne Valley Inn, and more particularly the closure signs all along the valley have caused frustration, and the Flood and Emergency Group are raising this with the Southern Water team to see if the signs could be more specific. However, it was pointed out that by this time last year, with a similarly high water table, we were enduring constant tankering along the valley, and so far this has been avoided, so while the scheduled programme of Southern Water works is not complete, there has clearly been effective progress.

**The Big Breakfast** was held on Sunday 12<sup>th</sup> January as a fund raiser for the planned reorganisation of the children's play area, MUGA and car parking space, and provisional plans were on display. It was very well attended and provided a useful contribution to the sums that need to be raised.

Dates have been agreed for **spring litter picking sessions**: the **Stoke** Village Fund plan theirs for **Saturday March 23**<sup>rd</sup>, and **St Mary Bourne** will be the week before on **Saturday March 15**<sup>th</sup>. Please make a note of these dates if you could spare a few hours on a Saturday morning; there will be a reminder in next month's copy.



### Fantastic Four achieve first foundation belt!

Congratulations are in order to four young students (karateka) of the St Mary Bourne Su-Ha-Ri Karate club! At the end of last year, Felix Simmen, Billy Ferris, Téa Creighton-Wilson, and Patrick Maitland attended the Hart Leisure Centre in Fleet for their first official grading. In our style of Karate, Wado-Ryu, the students are awarded a red belt as their first level - known as "9th Kyu". They may not have known it at the time, but they were graded by the World Chief Instructor. There is no rush as there is an emphasis on getting the techniques right to give them that foundation on which to build. The style includes Jiu-Jutsu and fighting.

Following the bow-on etiquette, the karate-ka were tested on delivering their deadly punches, head blocks and lower blocks, while standing in "Shiko-dachi" or 'ready' stance. Secondly, from "Hanmi-gamae" or 'fighting' stance, they were required to show a front-kick and a "gyaku-zuki", punching from the fist opposite the



front foot. Finally, in another test of body co-ordination, they had to execute a turning block - i.e. you hear someone attacking you from behind, so you turn quickly to face them and block their attack. Unfortunately for me, no cars were waxed or fences painted in preparation for this test as teaching methods have been modernised since 1984(!)

All four showed great courage: This was a test taken with probably 30-40 other children of different ages from all over Hampshire - all going for different grades. I am sure the reader will join me in congratulating them again and wishing them good luck for the next level: Yellow belt.

Unlike so many seaside resorts Old Felixstowe has retained a great deal of its charm and grandeur and I don't find it remotely as depressing as say Weston Super Mare which is quite the most ghastly place I've ever been to. The irony being there is simply nothing Super about it. I have just noticed one of the neighbour's chickens in the garden standing on one leg with its mouth open. This is called "The Gapes" and is not a good sign in a chicken. I know because I have kept chickens and when they get the gapes they are generally not long for this world. Perhaps I should give it some sherry and a glacier mint? But chickens give up on life easily and there is only one creature that beats them at that game; and that is sheep. Sheep get depressed and will come up with almost any excuse to die. If they could read, then I'm sure a poor Google review would finish them off. The life expectancy of a sheep in Weston Super Mare must be zilch.

But I should be writing about Binley, and I have resorted to the internet to find out some interesting facts. But hang on... what's this? The Binley Mega Chippy? A chippy here in Binley? Who is behind this fantastic idea? Those entrepreneurial Maclays? I suddenly have visions of Elizabeth manhandling the saveloys as Mark in a stained apron skims the scraps from the top of the frying fat. But there's more... apparently couples are driving up to Binley woods at night where "shenanigans" are taking place? Shenanigans? I must have been going around with my eyes shut! Ah... Damn! Different Binley. Apologies. This is Binley a suburb of Coventry! So, no fish suppers and no shenanigans. How very disappointing. But I do have something real and exciting to tell you about, because someone has faithfully recreated The Somme circa 1916 between Cold Harbour Farm and the Wadwick road complete with water filled foxholes, trenches, barbed wire, mud and \*\*\*\* everywhere and rats! ### Remembering...

Frederick Henry Cook 16<sup>th</sup> May 1932 – 15<sup>th</sup> November 2024

Freddie was born at Hoopers Farm, Kings Somborne on 16 May 1932, where his father was working at the time. He had a younger brother David and sister Doreen. After school, Fred started work with his father as a farm worker. They worked at many different farms until coming to Egbury Farm where the family lived the longest. Fred's brother David also joined them there to work on the farm.

Fred enjoyed dancing and used to go to dance classes and that is how he met Sylvia at a dance at Woodcott Hall. Sylvia lived at Woodcott at this time with her parents and worked in Binley for Lady Mellor. Fred and Sylvia later married at Woodcott Church on 28th March 1959. They had 4 children Ian, Trevor, Michael and Debbi. They also had 3 wonderful grandchildren, Daryl, Natalie and Mia.

In the early days of marriage, Fred had a motorbike with a sidecar which he and Sylvia used to travel around in. One day when Sylvia was pregnant with their first child, Fred had to swerve to avoid a big American car and then hit a telegraph post which brought on Sylvia's labour and Ian was born early. The couple then lived at Wadwick in a house which came with Fred's job on the farm. Trevor and Michael were born there. Later, the family moved to Dunley and in 1965 their daughter Debbi was born.

Fred continued to work on the farm until he retired at the age of 65 when he had the luxury of a workshop with a pit where he could work on his love of cars. He spent a lot of his time in his workshop, known to the family as his 'shed'. When he retired Fred and Sylvie moved to a smaller cottage next



door to where the family had lived. During retirement, Fred continued to buy and sell cars and repair local people's cars in his shed in Dunley. Fred had a few hobbies: motorbikes, flying hang gliders and he progressed to a microlight aircraft. He also bought a 3 wheeled kit car which Sylvie and he would enjoy days

out in. Fred gained his pilot's licence to fly light aircraft and he bought a microlight and used to go off to places like Isle of Wight and France with his mate (Jimmy Jones) who he spent many happy days with. When Jimmy died he decided to sell the microlight and spent more time driving his kit car and his motorbikes. Fred also helped out in the garden at the Dunley Manor and would chauffeur Captain and Mrs Brodrick around.

Unfortunately Fred suffered a brain aneurysm at the age of 79. Thankfully he recovered relatively well. He was able to celebrate his 80th birthday the following May and the family arranged a party and hired a motorbike and sidecar to take him there. Fred and Sylvie celebrated their 60<sup>th</sup> Wedding Anniversary 5 years ago with a party and 65th wedding anniversary last year; and his 90th birthday 2 years ago. Fred's health deteriorated and he struggled to get around which he found extremely frustrating being such an active man. He went into hospital in May 2024 and then onto a 24/7 care nursing home close by so that Sylvie could continue to drive herself and Tina (the family dog) to visit him.

Fred is sadly missed by all his family and friends who hold cherished memories of him

### Robert Mew

2<sup>nd</sup> March 1945 - 30<sup>th</sup> October 2024

Robert Mew was born in St Mary Bourne on the 2<sup>nd</sup> March 1945, a fact which accorded him much guiet amusement every time he was asked his date of birth -2.3.45. Rob was the second son of Frank, Blacksmith



and Master Farrier, and Joan Mew of The Forge St Mary Bourne - Len being the eldest and David being the youngest. The Mews had lived in St Mary Bourne ever since Oscar Mew, farrier, came to

the village after the First World War. Their craftmanship can be seen throughout the valley. Going for a walk with Robert was always punctuated by "My brother made that, my father made that, we put that in, I made that" and he was exceptionally pleased when he once mended a horseshoe gate that his grandfather had made in the 1920s. He loved the idea of something he had made lasting for a century or more, and the continuity of the family. Rob's entire life was lived in the Valley - St Mary Bourne, Hurstbourne Priors, Stoke and finally to Binley.

In many ways, Rob was a product of a bygone age he had the values, outlook and attitudes of an era which no longer exists. He would have fitted in very well in Lark Rise, or one of the villages that Thomas Hardy knew. He enjoyed being part of a community, where, especially growing up, he felt he knew everybody, he enjoyed the pace of living, the environment where the river rose and

fell, the crops grew and were harvested, and the Church reflected the seasons. The rhythms of life of living in a small village. He loved being the blacksmith and feeling that he had an important role to play in the village. He liked that The Forge had been passed down the generations, and that he handled the tools that his grandfather and father had made, and was able to continue with the same sort of work that they had done; he was resolved to continue until he could say there had been a Mew doing blacksmith work in the valley for more than 100 years, which he and Izzy achieved whilst working at various venues around the area.

At different times in his life Rob worked alongside all his children; Luke, when Luke was at school and college and used to go down the Blacksmith during holidays and weekends where he learnt how to weld and how to forge (metal that is, not signatures!); Abby and Polly, when he retired and joined them in the Inion Arts where he became known as the Expert Packer but was so much more; but mostly with Izzy. He taught her welding, forge work and how to mend machinery, and continued working with her when she swapped her welder for a mower and became involved in the upkeep of various football and cricket pitches.

Family was important to Rob – he gloried in the fact that his children lived so close to him. Izzy at home, Abby next door, Luke in Stoke and Polly up the road in Hurstbourne Tarrant. He particularly enjoyed being a grandfather and this was reflected in the care and concern all his grandchildren displayed towards him in his final days. During the last few days of his life, he made sure he spoke to each of them individually, and right up to the very end he was worrying about making sure Christmas would still be a magical time for them, no matter that he wouldn't be here to enjoy it with them.

He was a good man, with an innate desire to help anyone that needed his help and who could turn his hand to virtually anything. He was a hard worker, with a strong work ethic, who believed in giving good value, and a talented craftsman who took great pride in making beautiful and useful things in metal and in wood. Above all else, he was a kind man who took pleasure in just being himself. Rob lived the life he wanted, in the way he wanted, and we, his family and his friends, are all the richer for having been a part of it.

### **PRECEPT 2025/26**

The precept is the council tax collected on behalf of a parish council to cover its service delivery within the community. Parish councils do not receive any direct funding from central government and rely on their precept, plus any income they generate from services or facilities they provide.

In Longparish, the Parish Council are responsible for a number of the facilities and services in the village, many of which are funded by the precept. Services that Longparish Parish Council provide include but are not limited to grass cutting, tree maintenance, litter and dog refuse management, provision of and management of local amenities including the playground, football field, allotments, cemetery, Village Hall (gravel) car park, bus shelters, the War Memorial, the Ashburn Rest, the Grindstone, the Stocks, the Burnaby Cross, the Common nature reserve (off Southside Road), the sand pit by Larkwhistle Farm, and the chalk pit by Vale Farm. Additionally, the Parish Council acts on behalf of the village in presenting local opinion to Test Valley Borough Council and Hampshire County Council on highways issues, planning applications and other matters affecting the village. Councillors give their time and services freely to benefit the parish however a Clerk is employed on a part-time basis to ensure sound financial and administrative management of the Parish Council's activities. Many repair and maintenance tasks continue to be undertaken by parish councillors and our wonderful group of dedicated volunteers, reducing the pressure on the budget and the precept.

At the Parish Council meeting on 13th January, the Longparish Parish Council resolved to set the precept at £25,534 for 2025/26 (increased from £20,295 in 2024/25.) This was calculated based on a budget forecast of £13,037 income, £38,570 expenditure for the year, with the shortfall to be covered by the precept. The amount listed on your council tax bill for a Band D property is estimated at £74.88 per household for the

year. However, the charge for properties in different housing bands will vary.

The reasons for the necessary increase this year is that Longparish Parish Council have for many years benefited from reduced costs for its grass cutting and administration. These services were delivered by dedicated individuals who worked on behalf of the Parish Council for a great number of years at consistent rates, however both have recently stepped down from their roles. When going out to tender, the Parish Council discovered the sector rates for these services are much higher than they have been paying. This combined with increasing regulatory obligations means that the Parish Council have had to increase the budget by £2513 for grass cutting and £2683 for administration in a bid to find suitable contractors willing to fulfil these services.

Retroperspective - a Concert by the Trifarious
Ensemble to raise funds for St. Nicholas' Church

Think of a classical music recital and images of polite applause, a hushed atmosphere and performers in formal clothes might come to mind. But the way classical music is performed is starting to change. Programmes are diversifying, performers are trying their hand at composing, arranging and improvising, and new technology is making it ever easier to incorporate images and sounds into a concert alongside live music. Classical musicians are becoming producers or curators as well as performers; they are thinking about how a concert programme can be an integrated experience like listening to a favourite playlist,

podcast or album. The Trifarious ensemble - Tim Redpath (clarinets/soprano saxophone), Rachel Calaminus (violin/viola) and Tom Armstrong (arranger) - are big fans of

these innovations. For several years they have been researching and experimenting together to create a concert that takes old music in new directions; their performance in aid of St Nicholas' Church will be



the first opportunity for an audience to experience the result.

'Retroperspective' looks backwards and forwards; some of the pieces were composed hundreds of years ago, others are more recent, but each one has been reworked to provide a new lease of life and a fresh interpretation. The performance uses the latest technology to create a multimedia experience: video, lighting and sound design combine with music to stimulate the eye alongside the ear. Classical music is a varied and marvellous world; arrangements of symphonies, tone poems, preludes and even tangos rub shoulders on the programme. For the novice listener, classical music buff and all those concertgoers in between, Trifarious Ensemble at St Nicholas' will offer something new to experience this winter.

Very many thanks to the whole village for all your support resulting in a really good profit for last year's fete 2024. The 50% of that profit meant that we had £6,000 available for distribution to the various village projects, who applied for funds.

The committee deciding the distribution consisted of: -John Young - Chairman of the fete committee 2024, and Churchwarden

Harriet Lily - Chairman elect for 2025
Gill Williamson - Church Treasurer
Peter Hull – Churchwarden
Stuart Montague – Chairman of the Village Hall
Andrea Hulme – representing the LCA
Malcolm Edwards – representing the Parish Council

We met early in December to allow distribution of funds before Christmas, or year end. A fruitful discussion was had as we considered the various projects, and we unanimously came up with the following distribution: -

- Longparish Church of England Primary School -£1,500 towards a new audio system for the School and Community Hall.
- Little School £500
- Longparish Cricket Club £1,500 towards various costs in running the club (e.g a new lawn mower, an electronic upgrade for doing the scoring etc.).
- Greening Longparish £500 towards wet meadow seed and grass mix, and the purchase of Swift, Swallow and Martin nesting boxes.
- The Parish Council £1,000 towards a gaspowered generator to be located at the Plough to be used if and when there are any significant power outages due to adverse weather, in order to look after any vulnerable residents.
- St Nicholas Parish Church £1,000 towards gutter repairs and path lighting.

### A MID WINTER WALK

Looking out of the window it's very frosty and the thermometer is reading -3C. So, wrap up warm and off we go. A quick look at the feeders. Blue and Great Tits and 7 Goldfinches not a bad start. Down the back path and see what's on Arthur's feeders: the same except for House Sparrows. Turn right at the shop and 6 Starlings are in a tree at Test Cottage. A lot more **Sparrows** at Preston Cottage. Moving on, a pair of Collared Doves and a Woodpigeon are sat in an apple tree on my right. At the Pony Paddock are some Rooks, Jackdaws, and a Magpie flying over. Turn left into Mill Lane and a pair of Greenfinches are sat at the top of a beech tree. There are 3 Blackbirds raking the leaf litter looking for food. There is a lot of honking coming from the fir trees. It's hard to make out how many there are when 2 fly out still a lot of honking and another 2 fly out and I can hear 2 still honking. That is at least 6 **Ravens**, not seen that many together before. At Lower Mill bridge there are 4 Cormorants sat in an old oak tree that will please Andy. Turn left towards the Ford and at the Trout Farm are **Great** Herring and Black Headed Gulls, Mallard, Tufted Duck, Gadwall, Moorhen, Coot and a noisy Carrion Crow oh and 2 Redwings. On we go towards the ford a pair of **Dunnocks** on the side of the road. I'm going over the frozen puddles I love the sound of breaking ice. At the ford only Mallards, blimey 29 that's a lot. Turn right into Nuns Walk and a flock of Long Tailed **Tits,** nothing else with them, a bit disappointing. The usual **Buzzard** in the trees to my left. Turn right on to South Side bridge, there is a Little Egret catching fish close to the bridge. Upriver there are 2 Little Grebes, and the usual Kingfisher is sat on its usual branch

which is 3-4m above the river. Turn right back into Mill Lane and a male **Chaffinch** is sat on the old ash tree. Carrying on and a **Robin** is sitting on top of the hedge singing, one of the few birds which sing all year. On we go. Just before the bridge I can see a



small bird on the dead thistles. Need the binoculars for this, it's a **Marsh Tit.** I don't see many of them. Back to the bridge nothing new here so on we go. Halfway down the beech hedge a **Jay** flies over, off to find it's stash of acorns. Turn right, a quick look in the Pony Paddock, nothing new. So, on we go, I think it's time we headed home. Up the back path and a **Wren** is in the bush to my right. Back home to get warm and just have a quick look at the feeders- yes, a female **Blackcap** who visits every now and then.

So, I hope you enjoyed our walk we saw 38 different birds, not bad.

### Jeffrey Wiseman 1935 – 2024

Jeffrey and his wife, Susan, bought their cottage in Longparish in the early 80s when his furniture company, Ducal, outgrew London and started acquiring space in Andover. Eventually it had 11 units and became the second biggest employer in Andover, with over 900 people at its height.

Jeffrey was born in Whitechapel, London. His grandfather came to London from Romania and set up as a cabinet maker. Jeffrey's father set up on his own during the war and named his company after the road off Brick Lane where they were located - Ducal Street. In the late 50s, Jeffrey joined the business and later took it over.

Jeffrey met his wife, Susan, at Finchley Lido on a day off from work. She was a beautiful Austrian au pair learning English, a necessity for her chosen career in hotel management. She also learned the rules and customs of Judaism, and after a lengthy conversion process, they were married in 1964 though in the climate at the time "marrying out" caused many problems from both families and it was only after the birth of James in 1967 that relations mellowed. Their second son, Simon, was born in 1970.

They both loved Longparish. He generously supported various village projects and took part in the L2SOTM run when he was in the village. He was a governor at Icknield School in Andover and often went in at the weekend to sweep leaves from the playground.

Jeffrey was, at his core, a salesman, with a genuine interest in people and an outgoing personality. He loved to talk to everyone he met. At Ducal, he was at his happiest being on the road with the guys visiting customers, understanding

their businesses, taking orders, or chatting on the factory or showroom floor. He wanted to create a place where everyone - colleagues and customers - felt genuinely valued, and proud to be part of the Ducal "family".

He worked tirelessly to build on the success of his business. But he was devoted to his family and particularly to his wife, Susan, who died in 2018. He took the opportunity to retire in 2001, reluctantly selling Ducal to Silentnight.

After retirement, Jeffrey took up creative writing again and followed his other passion, music. He took singing lessons and sang in choirs. He became part of a choir going into nursing and care homes, cheering up the residents with songs from the shows which he loved.

Jeffrey was an inspiring father who looked after, encouraged and loved his family. In their retirement, his and Susan's great delight was their grandchildren, Hannah, Sam and Max and he was their role model. He worked hard and achieved great success, inspired others but was modest to the end. He knew how to enjoy life and lived with curiosity and passion. His strength, love and kindness, will live on in all of us who knew him.







South East's Beautiful South Awards is commendable, with a gold in the 'Café/Tearoom of the Year 'and a bronze in the 'Small Visitor Attraction 'categories.

Looking ahead, Whitchurch Silk Mill has several exciting events planned. On **Sunday**, 22<sup>nd</sup> **June** 2025, the Mill will host an Open Gardens event in Whitchurch. Building on the success of the 2023 event, which sold over 200 tickets and raised more than £2,600, this year's event will offer more information about the gardens and activities for children.
