The Olympic and Paralympic Games

It has been incredible to watch so many talented and gifted athletes take part in the Olympic and Paralympic Games this year. It is so easy to forget how much hard work and relentless training is involved to be the best in the world. We can only imagine what it must feel like to win a gold medal after all that fierce competition and pressure.

I am reminded of the Olympic values of *excellence, respect* and *friendship* that underpin the Games and help to promote a better world. Along with the Paralympic values of *courage, determination, inspiration* and *equality*, they show us what can be achieved when we work together for the common good. Athletes from all over the world have gathered to represent their countries in peace and strive to create an atmosphere of challenge and acceptance. As they do this, they make some great achievements and break world records often in inspiring ways.

This year is special because it is 100 years since Eric Liddell won gold at the 1924 Summer Olympics in Paris in the 400 metre race. Eric went to Edinburgh University to read for a BSc in Pure Science but ended up playing a lot of rugby and athletics. He was capped for the Scotland international rugby team seven times and is one of a rare few who had his cap reissued and was inducted into the Scottish Rugby Hall of Fame in January 2022, on the centenary of his first international cap.

Eric also became known as the fastest runner in Scotland when he was at university and so he began training for the Olympics. He originally trained for the 100 metre sprint but ended up dropping out when he discovered the qualifying heats were on a Sunday. As a devout Christian he refused to work on a Sunday so trained for the 200 and 400 metre sprints instead. At the Games, he finished third in the 200 metre sprint and won a bronze medal, but surprised everyone and went on to win the 400 metre race winning gold. He won it in a time of 47.6 seconds which was an Olympic and World Record. After this great achievement, which was later immortalised in the film '*Chariots of Fire'*, Eric decided to become a missionary teacher and moved to China. In 1943 the Japanese invaded China and he was sent to an internment camp where he helped look after the children and continued to teach them there. He was affectionately known as Uncle Eric. He became unwell and sadly died there on 21st February 1945, five months before liberation having given his life to help others.

Eric Liddell took his inspiration from Jesus Christ and followed His example of sacrifice even to his death to show God's love to everyone, regardless of their nationality or status. Stories like this remind us of the importance of those Olympic and Paralympic values which are relevant not just to athletes, but to us all. In life we all need to show each other *respect* and *friendship*. We need to demonstrate *courage* and *determination* particularly when we are in difficult situations, in turn *inspiring* people to do good things to help others. I hope you enjoyed watching the Games.



Continuing our late summer ride up the B3048 Highway to the North - Part 6

The nine 34ft span arches of Hurstbourne viaduct, completed in 1854, remain a most impressive monument to Victorian railway

construction. Shrouded in trees on its left is where the 'Nile Valley' Hurstbourne to Fullerton railway once joined the main line. The lyrical water meadow to its south does not prepare the traveller for the largescale horticultural enterprise on the other side. The dynamic Eliza James deserves a blue plaque for transforming the sleepy watercress beds she found in 1908 into the prime supplier of this most healthy food to London retail and restaurant trades. The key was Hurstbourne Station (closed 1964) up the hill to the right. Where Hirst's scrap metal plant traded for 50 years, is now St Mary's Hill housing estate.

In round terms, half the population of these parishes lives along the coming two and a half miles of the B3048, though it is hardly densely populated. The stretch running north of the viaduct takes in Lower and Upper Link, before reaching the village. Link to where? you might well ask. Not many of us are fluent enough in Old English (Anglo-Saxon) to know that *hlinc* meant 'shelf on the edge of rising arable land'—Dr Stevens, writer of the authoritative Parochial History of St. Mary Bourne (1888), did. At last, there is another open pub on the left, The Railway Inn, as it began life, now The Bourne Valley. The other celebrated local historian, Kathleen Innes, lived further up on the right, at Portway, the new house she and her husband George built in 1938 and their residence for the next 30 years. It's a good name for a house just north of Portway Roman Road (Silchester to Old Sarum, the RR4b), which crosses the B3048 just before the turn to Derrydown. To the left is the lane which leads to the only public health facility (discounting pubs and churches) along this road, the Derrydown Clinic (1953), now part of Two *Rivers Medical Partnership* with Whitchurch Surgery.

All of which brings us to the village of St Mary Bourne, the narrow winding Church Street, with its many thatched cottages. Constricted by its narrow bends and parked cars, traffic along this stretch is calmed, sometimes to the point of stand-off. To the right looms the church where nothing lines up. It ought to be St Mary's, but is dedicated to St Peter: its north aisle pillars do not align with those of the south aisle; the chancel is at an angle to the nave; it has a font (and what a font!-the nearest similar being in Winchester cathedral!) when chapels-of-ease (as it was until 1928: only then was St Mary Bourne designated as a parish) had neither baptismal nor burial rights. So, why is there a centuries-old churchyard around it, with its ancient yew? Very puzzling. MC 🍀 Join Us at the Longparish Village Fete! 🍀

HIGHWAYS

A Sugar Lane resident updated the council on matters relating to the condition of Sugar Lane (see previous PC Minutes for details). Potholes have been repaired, and more defects have been reported to HCC including road subsidence, and a damaged drain cover. The road sweeper has attended twice, removing debris, and SSE are scheduled to undertake tree work. A guote to remove the root-bound soil is being sought by the resident, and a question was raised about whether or not the PC could contribute to the cost. Residents have also committed to assisting in keeping the road clear going forwards. The Parish Council continues to support the improvement works, with the Tree Warden offering to meet SSE contractors onsite. 

ASHBURN REST STREAM VERGE TO MOW OR NOT TO MOW..... A point of view by Christian Dryden

Last week I walked along the stream verge admiring the variety of flower and plant species, red, yellow, pink, purple, and white flowers dotted along it with plenty of bees, ladybirds, larvae and insects buzzing around. This week, this beautiful mixed ecosystem has been damaged having been cut too early. I thought it would be helpful to explain why the verge had been left to grow.



Three years ago, the Parish Council took on the management of the Ashburn Rest verge as a conservation project developing the verge to make a nature corridor and to benefit insects. and butterflies. This

contributed to the Making Space for Nature phase of Greening Longparish.

A fee was paid to Hampshire County Council for a licence and funds spent on wetland seed mix as well as the management of the verge, which involved selective strimming and weeding by our own resident ecologist and many volunteers, including younger residents enthusiastic about the environment.

The vegetation along the verge is not always seen as conservation, but as a hindrance and a contractor has vet again cut it before the optimal time for the seeds to ripen, drop and germinate. Mowing now, before any seed has had a chance to set, is the worst possible timing and has negated the selective strimming conducted in the Spring.

A LATE SUMMER WALK by Chris Bowman

Starting from home as usual down the back path only a few House Sparrows on Arthur's well stocked feeders. Noticeably quiet down here now the overgrown garden has been cleared. Turn right at the shop and a couple of Collared Doves are sat on the wires so on we go. Lots of House Sparrows in the hedge at Preston Cottage. There is another flock in the hedge by Elm Cottage. It is a job to see into the pony paddock now the hedges have grown. Turning left into Mill Lane, two Blackbirds on the side of the road and a bit further up I can see a **Dunnock**. I can hear the unmistakable honk of the Raven as it flies over. On to the bridge, quiet here it has been all year, I do not know why. Turning left towards the ford, I can see there are a lot of birds at the Trout Farm. Greater, Lesser-Backed Gulls, Herring Gull, Black-Headed Gull, 3 Herons, 4 Little Egrets, Swan, Canada and Greylag Geese, Mallard, Tufted Duck, Gadwall, Coot, Moorhen, Mistle Thrush, Pied and Grey Waqtails. I am about to go when a small flock of House Martins and Swallows stop off for a drink before their long journey. They are leaving earlier this year. On we go, a lot of feral cats about today. On to the Ford nothing we have not already seen so turn right into Nuns Walk. There is a flock of Long-Tailed Tits, I love finding a flock of them as you do not know what else is with them. Great and Blue Tits, Chiffchaff, Blackcap, and a Tree Creeper climbing up the side of a tree. Carrying on, a Robin on the fence beside me. Turning right onto the bridge 2 Little Grebes are upriver and then a Kingfisher taking a detour around me. Turn right back into Mill Lane and a Red Kite is circling high above me and then another joins it and then there is a **Buzzard** going around on a thermal. On we go, a couple of **Goldfinches**, I do not see many of them about. Just before the bridge a little Wren flies across the road. I can see a Pheasant in with the sheep, nothing else so on we go at Tudor Cottage, cross the road to see into the pony paddock, just a few Rooks and Jackdaws. Moving on, a flock of 15 Starlings fly over and with that back home.

I hope you have enjoyed our walk and we saw **forty-one** different birds.



CHURCHYARD WILDFLOWERS

T has been a quieter month in our fledgling wildflower meadow. The mighty thistle still reigns supreme and has been flowering for weeks, but it has also been joined by a profusion of nettles, which are less welcome. Luckily, there are clumps of dock leaves growing nearby, should anyone need them. The wildlife has been enjoying the cow parsley in particular: in addition to the bees and butterflies, we have spotted red soldier beetles and black and yellow longhorn beetles crawling about on the flowers.





RECIPE OF THE MONTH

t this time of year, as the weather mellows and turns autumnal, the hedgerows of HBP are laden with ripening blackberries. So our ingredient for this month's seasonal recipe really picks itself; I challenge anyone to go for a walk and not come back with tell-tale streaks of purple all over their fingers... But what to do with all these berries? There are the obvious things like crumbles, jams, pies and jellies, but you hardly need me to tell you about them. So instead, why not combine your glut of blackberries with that other seasonal stalwart and plentiful local delicacy: venison. Here is a blackberry sauce to accompany a pan-fried or roasted venison loin, like this:

Serves 6

1kg venison loin
1tsp dried thyme
250g pancetta, thinly sliced
1tbsp vegetable oil
2tbsp sloe gin
200ml reduced beef stock
6 juniper berries, crushed
200g blackberries
25g butter
salt and freshly-ground black pepper



- Trim the venison of any fat, rub with oil and season with salt, pepper and dried thyme.
- Lay the pancetta slices on a piece of clingfilm to make one sheet, place the loin at one end of the sheet of pancetta, and roll so the loin is wrapped in the pancetta.
- Heat the vegetable oil in an oven-proof frying pan, and sear the loin until golden-brown on all sides.
- Place the pan in the oven at 180C/350F for 6-8 minutes, or until the venison is cooked but still pink inside. Remove from the pan and keep warm.
- In the same pan, heat the sloe gin, beef stock and juniper berries and reduce for about 5 minutes.
- Strain the sauce, return to the pan and add the blackberries. Cook for about 4 minutes, until softened, and crush slightly with the back of a spoon.
- Stir in the butter and season. Carve the loin, and serve with the sauce.



Andover Astronomical Society Thursday 19th September - 7.30pm Hurstbourne Tarrant Community Centre *Galaxies* - Dr. Or Graur

Finally, they were asked what advice they would give Year Five as they became Year 6. And they offered these thoughts:


- Don't be frightened.





WATERCRESS & WINTERBOURNES

The Boatman's Bubble



In the margins and meanders of our chalk streams where there is a slower flow, amazing insects swim across the surface. Lesser water boatmen may be small – up to 1.5cm long – but their unique

characteristics make them a memorable sighting. There are several species in their family (*Corixidae*), and while they are hard to tell apart with the naked eye, their common features can help you to spot them.

The first thing to look for is a brown, boat-shaped body, although a close look at most lesser water boatmen will reveal golden yellow stripes. Another clue is a pair of long legs; their oar shape and 'fringe' of hairs are handy for both swimming and floating on the surface. Then there are the large, reddish-brown eyes, which have a compound structure that combines many tiny lenses to create a wide view.

Despite living in ponds, lakes, and rivers, lesser water boatmen don't have gills. Instead, they employ a clever trick for taking longer dives: their undersides are covered in water-repelling hairs, which trap a bubble of air against their bodies. This bubble acts like the tank of a scuba diver, feeding the insects oxygen through small holes – or 'spiracles' – in their exoskeletons. This comes in handy when foraging for food, which for most species will be algae and dead organic material.

You may be wondering... are there greater water boatmen? Indeed, there are, although they are actually a different group of insects (*Notonecta*) and are usually referred to as 'backswimmers'. As the name suggests, these species swim upside down, so their air bubbles are more visible from above. This can make them appear silver in colour, but they are light brown with reddish eyes. Unlike most of their 'lesser' relatives, backswimmers eat small insects, fish, and crustaceans.

There is also the lesser or pygmy backswimmer (*Plea minutissima*) and several pygmy water boatmen (*Micronecta*). Despite being just 2-3mm long, one of the latter is famously noisy. The males of many water boatmen species 'sing' by stridulating, which means rubbing their legs along ridges on their bodies. *Micronecta scholtzi* has been recorded at 99.2 decibels – that's as loud as a car horn! Thankfully, water absorbs most of the sound, but you may still hear it if you listen carefully.

Insects like water boatmen are a key part of our chalk stream ecosystems. As food for fish, bats, birds, and amphibians, these small creatures are crucial to the health of many other animals. If you'd like to help protect their chalk stream homes, check out the Watercress and Winterbournes scheme at hiwwt.org.uk/winterbournes. Our work is supported by the National Lottery Heritage Fund.

Jenny Garrard baked a stunning **Showstopper Cake** which gained her 1st prize and there were over 100 entries for the **Dog Show**. The **children's classes** were bolstered by the Arts and Crafts session run prior to the day and the beautiful Miniature Gardens.

Thank you again for your continued support for the Flower Show & Fête - it is very much appreciated. Without everyone's support, and their entries, the Flower Show wouldn't be the success it is. Postcard from Binley

One of the things I have noticed from this rather unremarkable summer is the absence of old friends. I don't mean human ones though they too are dropping off their perches far too regularly. No, summer visitors to Binley. House martins for instance have built nests in the barn here for as long as I can remember. At the back of the barn an old split cane rod is suspended by two fallow antlers nailed to the beam. In previous years I would spend hours watching as the young house martins came out of the nest and worked their way on to the rod where they would line up as a troop awaiting the return of the parents with mouthfuls of flies. I haven't seen them now for three or four years and in the last decade alone I see visiting numbers to this country have nearly halved. As a fisherman I know only too well the shocking lack of fly life that now exists. Take a drive up this valley on a summer's evening thirty years ago and the windscreen would be smothered in dead fly life. Now? Nothing. It's tragic.

The art of matching a fly to an evening's hatch is virtually gone as there is no hatch and we fishermen faff around with imitation crane flies to our detriment. You could almost fish an entire season on the Test now with just four flies in your box. Further north things seem to be better; my trips to Sutherland and Speyside where far less pesticide is used show much healthier numbers of both fly and bird. To sit as I do on the banks of a Highland stream at 5am, as sand martins zoom in and out of their holes in the far bank and roe deer quietly swim across the pool below me. To see the ever so slightly comical Dippers throw themselves from a rock into the streamy water, only to bob up and surface a few yards downstream makes the act of casting a line secondary to the sublime privilege of seeing these things happen before your eyes.

But returning to Binley I am wondering where all our red kites have gone? I can only conclude they have gone the way of foxes and urbanised themselves. I certainly see more in Andover now quartering over suburban gardens than I do over the Downs, but perhaps they winter here during the shooting season and enjoy easy pickings before heading into town for the summer? Like all raptors they are intelligent and have an eye for an opportunity.

I cannot think of my thirty odd summers here in Binley without the Hummingbird Hawkmoth flitting from nectar rich bloom to bloom; but, despite a proliferation of flowers in the garden and record numbers here just two years ago I'm yet to see one. Perhaps I'm just unlucky. And low butterfly numbers are down to the cold and wet spring we had so that is to be expected.

For me, summer in the woods, spinneys and coppices around Binley has three distinct periods. The first; that magical and vigorous time when you are almost able to see and hear things springing into life, leaf and flower. This is followed by that second period when the sap has fully risen and nature takes a comparative rest for a few weeks as she asks us to stand back and take in all that she's done so admirably. And then, as I write now, we are entering that third and my favourite period of summer, the real time of harvest and mellow fruitfulness and not the decay that Autumn brings. I'm talking about those dwindling August days that melt into early September ones when even the hottest days are endurable and yet one can stand in a wood enveloped in cool stillness, the gentle hum of insects, the hushed canopy of leaves above, sometimes broken by the sudden screech of a Jay as it breaks from tree to tree. How a bird that is so stunningly beautiful can make such a racket is beyond me? One of God's many custard pies maybe.

Sunsets produce the most wonderfully delicate violet, purple and citrus hues. Gentle evenings and a moon reflecting the dying embers of the fast-sinking sun before becoming silver bright means it's time for me to pour a large single malt, light up a cigar and watch my pipistrelle bats go out on the hunt. Cheers! **NA**



Hai Karate fans!

The fledgling club at the Village Centre has now settled in with some regular young students. We now have a kernel of karate-ka ranging from 5 to 9 years old. They have proven to be full of energy, and Sensei has had his hands full directing that energy towards this ancient martial

art of empty hands. Without irony, some of the biggest effort has been getting the youngsters to either stand still, to kneel in 'seiza' position resting with hands on the knees, or to adopt a fighting stance. For those into group dynamics: We have been through forming, norming and storming (!).

The Dojo is still open to all new starters - especially as we approach the new school year: Every Wednesday 6.30 - 7.30pm. (See previous edition of Hill & Valley for the poster). We start with a 10 to 15-minute aerobic warmup, including calisthenics (press-ups, sit-ups, star jumps, burpees) and then stretching - which is key for older limbs like mine! We then go through the basics such as upperblocks (jodan), punches (chudan), lower-blocks (gedan) and how to kick in a straight line - more difficult than you think. Lots of co-ordination, balance and attention required. The lesson finishes with introductions to fighting techniques, pad work and a reaction-training game of "Traffic Lights" - which the kids love. They have now all attained licenses and club memberships and we are tracking through regular stamps in their attendance cards.

The best surprise for me has been how well the students have picked up the key words and commands in Japanese, yet the first task is to get them all into a vaguely coordinated troop that can respond fast, remain safe with each other and meet the basics set out in the syllabus. Yes, there is a syllabus, honed over the past 50 years, and our first Red Belt grading is scheduled for the end of September in front of the world chief instructor, Jon Wicks. Pictured above is myself with the late Wado-Ryu grand-master Tatsuo Suzuki, many years ago, whose teachings we are following.
