

St Francis of Assisi

Stories of the life of Francis of Assisi (1182–1226) describe him as someone who talked to every element of the natural world, as well as to animals.

We are told he didn't speak to them as ordinary creatures but in terms of equality as fellow creations of God living on earth. He was always telling them who they were, why they should be happy, and why they made him happy. One of his early biographers wrote, "We who were with him saw him when he was with any creatures, touching and looking at them always in such joy, inwardly and outwardly."

There is a story about him and the wolf of Gubbio which goes like this:

Francis was living in Gubbio, Italy when a fierce wolf began attacking livestock. Soon it progressed to attacking humans; and not long after that, it began to hunt and eat them exclusively. It was known for lingering outside the city gates in wait for anyone foolish enough to venture beyond them alone. No weapon was capable of hurting it and all who attempted to destroy it were devoured. Francis decided to go and meet the wolf face to face. Some people followed him, staying back at a safe distance but were close enough to witness what transpired.

It is said that when the wolf rushed at Francis, he made the sign of the cross and commanded the wolf to cease his attacks in the name of God. The wolf trotted to him and then lay at his feet, putting his head in Francis's hands. Francis spoke to him; after which, tradition tells us, the wolf submitted to Francis, placing one paw in his outstretched hand. As they made their way back into the town centre, the townsfolk gathered in the city marketplace to await Francis and his companion and were shocked to see the ferocious wolf behaving as his pet. The wolf was assured by Francis that it would be fed by local people for the rest of his life.

St Francis addressed inanimate creation too, as he believed it indeed possessed a soul. We know this because his "Canticle of the Creatures" includes fire, wind, water, Brother Sun, Sister Moon, and, of course, "our Sister Mother Earth" herself.

Francis's lifestyle led to the formation of the Franciscan movement, the largest Christian religious order. For its followers it means a life of service to the poor and the marginalised, an affirmation of the unique worth of each person, an appreciation of beauty, reverence and respect for all creation, and faith in a personal and provident God. Franciscans can be found in over one hundred countries across the world.

Many people would agree with St Francis that the natural world has a way of helping us to understand the spiritual world and that a walk or time in the countryside refreshes us spiritually.

The spiritual blessings brought by the beauties of the natural world are vividly expressed in a poem by Ellwood Roberts, a few verses of which I attach below:

Full of joy is early Summer, Growth and warmth and golden light; Every day is crowned with beauty, Full of loveliness the night.

Dazzling sunshine brings the roses, Fills the whole bright world with bloom; Day and night rejoice together, Banished now are doubt and gloom.

Earth a veritable Eden
In the glowing sunlight gleams,
Life a grand and noble epic,
Viewed from such a standpoint seems.

Gladness reigns the wide world over, Early Summer's golden light Fills each bosom with thanksgiving For the season's blessings bright.

So, during these early summer days, I hope you can try to take a walk; or just go outside and look at the countryside around you, filling your heart with thanksgiving and gratitude for this wonderful place we live in.

Continuing our summer ride up the **B3048** Highway to the North - Part 4

East Aston to Hurstbourne Priors, south

Towards the north-east end of the Long Parish stands the second great house and beyond it, East Aston. There is plenty of time to take it all in as you carefully negotiate the seven near 90° bends in just two thirds of a mile. Rebuilt around 1700, in the next 200 years Longparish House was the seat of a succession of heads of the Hawker family, conveniently all named Peter. But it was Colonel Peter Hawker (1786-1853) who made a name for himself as writer and 'great shot'. He is, perhaps, Longparish' most famous son. While early maps show the road negotiating three sides of the park in front of the house, it is arguable that once it ran nearer the house: there lingers still a footpath right-ofway from the south entrance gates. A film-crew were once encountered, scouring the area for a house they had heard about, built 'like a French chateau': '... an agreeable, almost French, appearance', writes Pevsner, of Longparish House.

East Aston is the final settlement of Longparish, with its sharp bends and narrow road. But it is worth stopping here for a break, wandering among the delights of Upper Mill and the adjacent channels of the Test and its wooden bridges - so many beautiful walks. It is on the final sharp corner, where the road turns almost directly north towards Hurstbourne Priors, that the parish and borough boundaries run, again unmarked. But now you have left Test Valley and are in Basingstoke and Deane borough, 'Birthplace and home of Jane Austen', as road signs elsewhere trumpet loudly.

This last lap of the original 1923 B3048, almost a mile, reaches the junction with the A30 (yes, according to the 1923 map: it was soon relegated to the second division, B3400) which divides Hurstbourne Priors. Beyond the water meadows to the east of this stretch lies 'where the bright waters meet', that celebrated, but inaccessible place, where the River Bourne joins the Test. The settlement of Hurstbourne Priors strings along mainly on the left after almost 2/3 mile of fields, up to the crossroad, ending with The Hurstbourne, previously The Portsmouth Arms, now converted to houses. Whether founded by, or a nod to, the great landowners, the Earls of Portsmouth at Hurstbourne Park, the inn existed from at least 1853. It no doubt also gained passing trade from the Andover-Basingstoke turnpike road of 1754 (A30/B3400). As with other villages cut in two by a busy main road (Hurstbourne Tarrant, for instance) the two halves of this village have a subtly different 'feel'. Here, the southern run was historically more 'chapel', the northern, 'church', though the social mix of both was in fact very similar - apart from the magnificent seat of the earls of Portsmouth, Hurstbourne Park. More on that next month...

The club launched on 8th May, but some of you may have spotted a group of us using the hall for Karate practice over the past six months. I am running a Karate-for-kids session from 6.30 -7.30pm every Wednesday at the Village Centre.

Bourne Valley Karate

club is a grassroots club started by me having been a member of the Su-Ha-Ri Club and the Wado International Karate-do Federation (WIKF) for over 35 years. I have had the privilege of training with some of the best Karate practitioners and teachers (Sensei) in the world and wish to teach you a little of what I know. Our founder was Professor Tatsuo Suzuki who brought Karate to England in the 1960's; I achieved my black belt under him in 2008 after many years of training under Jon Wicks - now the World Chief Instructor.

Karate is a traditional Japanese fighting art and involves much patience, application, and personal discipline. These are all values and life skills that you can hope to improve in attending regularly. 'Kara-te' means "empty-hand" and has roots in Chinese Kung-fu. Wado-Ryu is our karate "style" and teaches deflections (blocking) and avoiding in defence as well as speed and attack - elements from original Okinawan Jiu-Jutsu. Su-Ha-Ri is from the 'Shuhari' teaching concept in Japanese and is the name our long-established club from the Hampshire-Surrey borders covering Fleet, Farnham, Alton and Basingstoke.

I hope this adds an exciting new dimension to our village's community offering – it is an honour to start a Dojo here. More from me in the forthcoming editions of Hill & Valley as we report progress and success from our young Sensei Simon 'Karateka'.

Looking for a good book? The wild world of Britain's rivers has inspired some truly wonderful nature writing. Here are four terrific tomes for your reading list!

Our first book is 'The Flow' by Amy-Jane Beer. It won the 2023 Wainwright Prize for nature writing, and details Beer's exploration of British rivers after losing a close friend. As a biologist turned naturalist, Beer combines ecological knowledge with a heartfelt desire to connect with wild places. As she rediscovers her love for our waterways and their wildlife, which are rendered in vibrant detail, she considers how caring for rivers helps us to find 'the flow' in our own lives.

Next, we have 'Elegy for a River' by author and ecologist Tom Moorhouse. This funny and thought-provoking book documents 11 years of fieldwork, most of which focused on Britain's endangered water voles. It offers fascinating insights into the complexities of ecological research, and the eccentricities of water vole society are explained with heartwarming fondness. Throughout, Moorhouse ponders the future of our wildlife, and how that future will be shaped by human actions.

Turning to the fantastical, we have 'River Folk Tales of Britain and Ireland' by Lisa Schneidau. An ecologist turned storyteller, Schneidau deftly weaves tales of ghosts, gods, and monsters into a mesmerising tapestry. The result is an intriguing dive into how humans have interpreted their relationship with rivers, and a testament to the enduring power of mythology. Expect awe about the wonders of nature, respect for its dangers, and wildlife species in starring roles.

Lastly, we have 'The Pull of the River' by Matt Gaw. This book documents a year of adventures along Britain's rivers,



most of which took place in a homemade canoe. Brimming with enthusiasm for the natural world, Gaw describes his many wildlife encounters with earnest humour and vibrant imagery. >>>>>

As he paddles, swims, and dives his way across the country, the book becomes an absorbing exploration of what it means to look for (and perhaps find) the wild.

All of these books can be borrowed through your local Hampshire library, and some are available as e-books too. So, if you don't already have one, consider grabbing a library card to enjoy spellbinding stories like these – membership is free! To learn more, visit

I was laid on the bed taking an afternoon nap the other day with my terrier Maurice, when in through the window came a stripey winged insect the size of a good butcher's sausage making a hell of a racket. I'm not sure who dived under the duvet for cover first but we lay there clinging to each other in fear waiting for the awful droning to subside. It was probably a large hornet or maybe a Queen wasp or perhaps one of these European wasps that Farage is so vexed about but whatever it was it was a big b***er.

But size isn't everything as I've been sympathetically told so many times and it was only last summer that I was stung by the tiniest black wasp-like creature I had ever seen that flew up my shorts as I was fishing. I can assure you that Trypoxylon figulus (or Bramble Wasp as it is commonly known) stings like hell and your nether regions are the last place you'd like it to visit.

What I do know is we have a lot to be thankful for here in this little Hampshire backwater and long may it continue. NA



Remembering...

Anthony (Monty) Dobson

16th March 1943 - 24th March 2024

Mont was born on the 16th March 1943. He was the youngest child of Alfred & Doris-Annie Dobson and had three older sisters, Viv, Lil and Marg. He spent his early years growing up in Vernham Dean & Buttermere,

moving to Upper Wyke when he was 6. He had a real country childhood, walking everywhere and learning about plants and animals. He always enjoyed being outside; helping out with farmwork and gardening whenever he got the chance.

petrol tankers. He had two sons with his first wife; Daren born in 1969, followed by John in 1971.

Mont was always keen on motor bikes and fine cars, especially Aston Martins. When living in Devon, Mont set up exhibitions for Aston Martins in Europe, even getting to drive the cars himself.

He moved back to Andover in the mid-80s when he started working at Vitacress as a driver and a maintenance engineer. Following redundancy from Vitacress, he worked for Keith Hirst at Bank Top, managing the yard. He made many friends and continued to work there until the business was sold. Mont was never one to sit around doing nothing. He took up garden work for people in the local area and kept his own productive garden from which he would supply fruit and vegetables around the villages and help out family and friends. He also helped out with maintenance work for the school, the church and the Pick-Your-Own.

Mont loved sport all his life. In his early years he played cricket, coached a boys football team in the village, and was a good darts player. He also loved bar billiards and once got to the last 16 in an All-England Competition in Jersey. In later years he took up golf and clay pigeon shooting and remained one of Manchester United's most passionate lifelong supporters.

Mont and Jenny got together in 1986. They first lived in Andover. They returned to live in the village in the early 1990s and married in October 1999. They had a great marriage together, shared a love of motorbikes, and enjoyed many holidays with family and friends. In October this year they would have celebrated their Silver Wedding Anniversary.

Unfortunately, over the last few years Mont suffered some health problems. He was hit by a van and also suffered a stroke. All of which took their toll. He became ill in January and needed time in hospital undergoing tests. Between hospital stays he was able to enjoy a couple of days with both his sons and all his grandchildren; some of them visiting from Singapore and Australia. He was immensely proud of his boys and loved them dearly and he adored his grandchildren Lewis, Hannah, Niamh and Holly. Hannah wrote a very loving tribute to her granddad which was read out at his funeral service on behalf of all the grandchildren.

Jenny spent the last few months caring for Mont, right to the end when Mont died peacefully and pain free at home on 24th March. He was loved so very much by Jenny, his boys, grandchildren, daughter in law Julie and all his family and friends. Some of the messages they have received describe him as "loving and caring", "truly a good man and a good neighbour", "kindest man always ready to help" and "part of the fabric of the village". Ian was born and grew up in Wyke Regis, Weymouth. He was one of 4 children - 2 sisters and an older brother.

His childhood was spent climbing over bombed out houses and raiding the coal holes of houses that had been flattened. At a time before mobile phones, he and his mates would disappear for whole days at a time, walking over the local fields and Chesil Beach.

Ian was not academic, preferring to spend his time at the local farm, milking cows and driving tractors, long before he was old enough to do so. Health and Safety hadn't made it to Weymouth at that point! On leaving school he went to Kingston Maurward Agricultural College and served an apprenticeship with a local farmer. He worked on farms for many years but did have a few breaks such as working for Securicor in London, guarding Lambeth Palace and he was on duty at Heathrow Airport



LONGPARISH WILDLIFE A LATE SPRING WALK

I know I did a walk not long ago, but I had to tell you about this one!

I left home as usual down the back path; a couple of Collared Doves are on the wires. At Arthur's are a Blackbird, a couple of Blue Tits and a Robin. Turn right at the shop, a couple of Starlings flying around. Carry on at Tom's house are some House Sparrows in the hedge and at the pony paddock are Jackdaws and a pair of Gadwall on the lake. Turn left, the usual Greenfinch is on top of the tree and a Raven sat on top of a fir tree honking. On to the bridge a Heron on the little bridge. Turn left at the Trout Farm are Canada and Greylag geese, Greater and Lesser, Black-Backed Gulls, Mallard, Tufted Duck, and a Coot - not much here today. Left at the ford - nothing new, so carry on. Turn right, a couple of Carrion Crows are in the field on my right.



On to the next lake, we have a **Swan** sitting on her nest, Moorhen, Pochard, Little Grebe, Little Egret. So, on we go, a **Red Kite** and a **Buzzard** are soaring on the thermals. Not a lot at Vale Farm, just a Magpie, Pied Wagtail, and a Cormorant landing in Nick's lake. On along the straight, a pair of **Linnets**, oh and a **Bullfinch** - don't see many of them now. Turn left into the Cleeves, a Great Tit and a Long-Tailed Tit just popped up from a bramble patch. Now the tricky bit, can I get through the flood it's a bit deep in places. I can see a Sedge Warbler on a reed in front of me. Well, I have gotten as far as Long Bridge, but I think that's it. A Cetti's Warbler singing in a bramble bush beside me, well, it's just flown across the road, how lucky was that. So, back to the crossroads, turn right and a few Woodpigeons fly out of the ivy. I can see a **Chaffinch** on the hedge in front of me. Carrying on, a few we have already seen. A Jay in front making a lot of noise. On past the ford, I like to stop in the gateway along here hoping to see a Skylark and I'm not disappointed. Also, a Pheasant, Red-Legged Partridge and a Magpie on the wires. Turn right onto the bridge, a Robin also a Grey Wagtail which is catching insects. Turn right into Mill Lane where a small flock of Goldfinches are sat in an old Ash tree. Another look in the Trout Farm, two **Swallows** flying around the lake and a **Blackbird**. On we go, something climbing up

the side of a tree it's a **Tree Creeper**. A **Goldcrest** in the Yew tree beside me. On to the bridge and a **Sparrowhawk** circling high above me. Carrying on back to the main road and turn right. Another look in the pony paddock a **Mistle Thrush**, **Rooks** and a **Songthrush**.

So, I hope you enjoyed our walk we saw **51** different birds, not a bad walk.



ST ANDREWS WILDFLOWERS

RECIPE OF THE MONTH

From late May through to the end of June, as you ramble along a hedgerow or through a wood, you may well come across an elder tree or two, which at this time of year will be laden with sprays of tiny star-like white flowers. And if the improved weather we've been enjoying of late has put you in mind of delicious things to stir through a summer cocktail or drizzle over a pudding, the below recipe for elderflower cordial from Sarah Raven might be of interest.

Makes 2 x 750ml bottles

Ingredients


- 1.35kg granulated sugar
- Flowers from 15–20 elderflower heads
- 2 oranges, thinly sliced
- 2 lemons, thinly sliced
- 2 limes, thinly sliced
- 30g tartaric (or citric) acid

As always with foraged produce, please make sure it is elderflower you are gathering. There is a good guide to identification on the Woodland Trust website, and please be aware that only the flowers and berries are edible, and even then, still somewhat toxic if you eat them raw. Cooking, as set out in the method below, makes them safe and far more appealing to eat. Also, be careful where you gather your elderflower: any flowers picked near a busy





road might give your cordial an unfortunate base note of traffic fumes, which is probably best avoided. Give the flowers a gentle shake to free any insects, rinse well in cold water, and they are ready to use! Here is what Sarah Raven suggests you do with them next:

- Put 1.15 litres water and the sugar in a saucepan, and dissolve the sugar completely before bringing to the boil.
- Add the flowers and return the water to the boil. Remove from the heat immediately.
- Put the thinly sliced fruit into a large bowl or jug.
 Add the tartaric acid and pour over the hot syrup and flowers
- Stir well and cover loosely.
- Leave for 24 hours
- Strain into warm sterilised bottles and seal. This
 keeps for a couple of months in the fridge. If you
 make plenty, pour some into plastic bottles and
 freeze. It will last for years.
