


Are you ready for Christmas?

Above all, let us always strive to be full of faith and to follow the example that the new-born King will set for us.

And, if we do these things then we will be truly ready.







Stoke to Hurstbourne Tarrant Concluding our now cold journey up the

B3048 Highway to the North - Part 8

Habitations thin out north of Stoke, the view across the meadows to the left and up to Wallop Hill Down (from the Portsmouth family name, once the great landowners of this area, or 'valley of the stream'? —both fit) and Doles Copse is so beautiful on a bright, sunny day. The third river bridge is the humblest, passed in a flash: just two brick walls flanking the road, near an ugly electricity substation. The river Bourne magically turns into the Swift on the parish border, which is marked by the unobtrusive sign 'Hurstbourne Tarrant' on the left at a farm track crossroads. The Swift is a wonderful sight in full flow, threading through the fields on a bright spring day, but just a green ditch for much of the year.

The road zig-zags left then right just before the old vicarage (late C17). Next to it, also on the right, is the 13th century St Peter's church, with its 1180s south doorway and medieval wall-paintings. The valley side rises steeply behind the church, its ancient churchyard entered through the roadside lych gate. Here we are in 'Uphusband' proper (say it in a thick 'ampshire accent: posh name, 'Hurstbourne Regis'). On the left is the school (1848) and out of sight behind it the modern Community Centre (2015) and recreation ground. The manor was the property of Tarrant Abbey, a nunnery in Tarrant Crawford, near Blandford Forum in Dorset, from 1266 to 1539. So, there is a medieval nunnery connection both at the beginning and end of the B3048.

Two-thirds of a mile brings us to the end of the B3048, the staggered crossroad in Hurstbourne Tarrant with the busy Andover-Newbury A343. There we pause to take stock, perhaps over a pint/glass of Merlot in The George and Dragon (hoping it is reopened after closure in 2024), on the site of a medieval inn. This close to the Scottish border, the air blows clearer and the hills reach higher than when we set off from warm and temperate Wherwell. The road itself has climbed 51m from start to finish.

We have journeyed through the old and the new—there were even streetlights in Hurstbourne Priors! But the old, the ancient, gives the road its depth and twists. Crossing two ancient trackways, two Roman roads, over three bridges, past two closed railway stations, under one railway viaduct, past four medieval churches (plus one lost Anglo-Saxon church at Stoke); at least nine 19th century dissenting chapels; five pubs, four open at the time of writing; one shop; four schools; countless houses and cottages, old and new; through historically vast estates with their smaller farms; and an Aston to Wallopful of Old English, Anglo-Saxon names... Let alone all those potholes—just like the old days. What a road!

REPORT FROM PC MEETING ON 18 NOVEMBER

PLANNING

OPEN SPACES

Cllr Hull updated the PC on the success of the last Clean Up Day. Volunteer numbers were lower, but a good selection of jobs was completed. Special thanks were given to Jo Barnard for leading the morning and Collards for providing a skip. It was agreed that a hedge trimmer will be purchased for future Clean Up Days.

The LCA have generously provided grants towards the new village noticeboards and the new football nets.

Moles have appeared on the football pitch and actions are being taken to resolve this.

The War Memorial needs cleaning and some maintenance work. Quotes will be obtained, and this will be budgeted for in 2025-2026.

The brief for grass cutting is being drawn up and quotes will be obtained in good time for next growing season. The allotments need a tidy up and the PC is currently seeking an allotment manager to ensure the area is well maintained. We welcome current allotment plot holders to put themselves forward and volunteer for this role.

HIGHWAYS

The PC have raised the issue of trees on Sugar Lane with HCC Highways. They have unfortunately informed us that the area in question does not fall under their responsibility. Cllr Storey has received confirmation that the works to the blocked pipes on Mill Lane (where the recent gully clearing has taken place) is scheduled.

The PC is continuing to liaise with Southern Water in order to get more advanced notice of any road closures and also different signage to state that businesses are still open in the event of road disruption.

RESILIENCE

The PC assigned £1500 from the PC General Reserve Fund to fund the shortfall to install the generator at the Plough Inn. Maintenance of the generator will be included in the 2025-26 budget.

LONGPARISH WILDLIFE

SCARLET IBIS



The Scarlet Ibis has been seen in the village on numerous occasions sadly not by me. Unless there are two of them, it has moved to Stodmarsh Nature Reserve in Kent and is causing quite a lot of attraction. It is believed to be from a private zoo or collection. The Scarlet Ibis which is sometimes called the

Red Ibis inhabits tropical South America and parts of the Caribbean. We have a Glossy Ibis which has bred in the UK for a few years. It's a bird like our Little Egret but with a long-curved beak. Its plumage is virtually scarlet the feathers may show various tints and shades, but only the tips of its primaries are inky black. Ibises nest in large colonies with other similar birds. In Southeastern Brazil, they gather in mid-September and build nests at the beginning of November. Egg laying within the colony is synchronous, with female birds laying eggs in three waves in early November, late December and late January. A clutch of 3-5 eggs is laid, incubated for 19-23 days, and fledge in 40-45 days. Their distinctive long curved bill is used to probe the earth for worms and invertebrates.

Admission is free but donations are welcome to offset the cost of hiring the Hall. There will be a cash bar.




Longparish Toddler Group needs you!

St Nicholas Churchyard Biodiversity Initiative

Following on from trial management of an area managed as a wildflower hay meadow by mowing in the Spring and then in mid-summer it was decided to manage the churchyard more sympathetically to encourage biodiversity.

This involved reducing the number of cuts to just four and mowing certain areas in more of a patchwork. The cut material or biomass was removed from site reducing nutrients, helping to arrest growth and encouraging perennial herbaceous plants to compete.

Existing plants seen were cowslips, lady's bedstraw, yarrow (see attached picture), harebells and pyramidal orchids. Plugs of betony, meadow saxifrage, dropwort, wild clary and more cowslips have been planted and seed sown on the molehills which provide a natural seedbed.

A young hare has been resident, and a robust bat-box has been installed on the large Cypress on the South side of the approach to the church.



This initiative comes, as Chris Packham has been discussing with the Church of England, on managing their estate more in sync with wildlife

The Lyche Gate - The Rise of the Phoenix from the Ashes

The rebuilding of the West Lyche Gate is underway with the erection of the two main uprights.



This work is being carried out by the Timber Framing craftsman Mark Barnett of the Andover Down Sawmill from locally sourced and

sustainably grown oak. Mark renovated and rebuilt the two bus shelters at the Hurstbourne Priors crossroads in the Spring of 2020. Weather permitting work on the new Lyche Gate should be completed by Christmas.



RECIPE OF THE MONTH

f course, any recipe I recommend this month should be something festive, but I doubt any of you need me to tell you how to roast a turkey, mince a pie, or stuff a goose. So instead, I suggest we turn our attention to the humble Brussels sprout, that much maligned, misunderstood, cruelly underestimated item of festive greenery. For many of us, sprouts are the seasoned gatecrashers of your Christmas party: you're not entirely sure how they got there, not everyone is thrilled to see them, but now they're here, you might as well make the best of it.

The good news is that sprouts are full of healthful things like vitamins, minerals and even a dash of

fibre – the antidote to just about everything else you might have for Christmas lunch. And they really do come from Brussels, or at least, they first appeared in northern Europe during the 5th century, and were eventually cultivated in what is now Belgium during the 13th century. Interestingly, Mexico is the second largest producer of sprouts, which I hope is useful information for any sprout super-fans planning their holidays.

The recipe I propose this month is a festive innovation for a sprout canapé from my father, late of this parish, much missed, formerly editor of these very pages, sprout evangelist, and frankly, a liability in the kitchen around Christmas. Please forget everything I just said about sprouts being terribly good for you; almost all of that good is about to be undone by the liberal introduction of bacon, cream and alcohol to proceedings, as follows:

Rule number one when it comes to sprouts is DO NOT BOIL YOUR SPROUTS. Instead, try roasting a bag of washed and trimmed sprouts with a bit of butter or cooking fats from whatever it is you roast on Christmas day. Whilst that is underway, finely dice some bacon (the streakier and smokier the better) and fry until fairly crispy. Add a festive splash of brandy to the pan and reduce. Stir in a little cream to finish, check seasoning, retrieve your sprouts from the oven, and serve on cocktail sticks with the bacon and brandy sauce as a dip. It isn't pretty, but it is guaranteed to convert even the staunchest of sprout skeptics.

And on that note, have a very happy Christmas, and if you are reading this in January, a happy 2025 too.

The Parish Council held its monthly meeting on Tuesday November 12th during which the Flood and Emergency Group gave an update on **Southern Water** and their subcontractors' progress with their programme of works. While this

continues to involve frustrating road closures, Southern Water are now working on the two main projects at Applegate and by the Bourne Valley Inn which they believe should make a significant improvement to the efficiency of the valley's sewerage system.

There was also an update on the **Play Area Project** to improve facilities for small children on the Recreation Ground, while also providing more badly needed parking space, for which a small team are working in collaboration with the Parish Council. This will require funds to be raised locally as well as from external grants, and the next **Big Breakfast** on January 12th will be in aid of this project.

The Council has been successful in an application to the Hampshire Forest Partnership to receive four disease resistant **elm trees** which will be delivered and planted early next year, three around the lake and one at the back of the Rec where their growth and durability will be monitored as part of the Partnership project.

WATERCRESS & WINTERBOURNES

The Water Rail's Tale

Even in the quietest parts of winter, our local chalk streams hum with activity. As coots and moorhens glide across the surface, one of their relatives may be hiding in plain sight. At around 23-28cm long, the water rail is



smaller than these more outgoing members of the *Rallidae* family, but just as fond of damp places. Ponds, marshes, reedbeds, wetlands, and rivers are all potential homes for this enigmatic bird.

One reason for the water rail's wide variety of habitats is its omnivorous

diet. Although it mostly eats fish, snails, and insects, it will also snack on roots, seeds, and berries. There are even reports of water rails catching small amphibians, mammals, and birds. With its long legs, long toes, and long beak, this species is perfectly adapted for hunting and foraging on boggy ground or in shallow water.

The water rail sports distinctive colouration that makes it easy to identify. Its face and underside are grey, while its back is dappled brown and black. Zebra-like stripes along its flanks lead into bright white feathers under its tail, and both its eyes and beak are a striking red. As a chick, the water rail's black feathers make it resemble a baby coot or moorhen – the trick is to look for a pale-yellow beak instead of a red one.

Despite having snazzy plumage and being relatively widespread, the water rail is notoriously elusive. Its camouflage helps it to blend into the undergrowth, and its skittishness causes it to run for cover when startled. The odds of a sighting do increase during winter, when the UK population is boosted by visitors from the colder parts of Europe. True to their cautious nature, these migrating birds usually travel at night.

While you need sharp eyes and good luck to see a water rail, you may have a better chance of hearing one. Of their greatest hits – which include creaks, whistles, groans, and even purrs – their most common call in wintertime is known as "sharming". Used to converse, mark territory, or express alarm, this call is a mixture of grunting and squealing that would make a piglet proud!

Since the water rail is so shy, it likes riverbanks that have lots of lush plant life. To welcome these beautiful birds, we need to allow a thick fringe of vegetation to flourish along the water's edge. To learn more about how chalk streams can be improved for wildlife, check out the Watercress and Winterbournes scheme at **hiwwt.org.uk/winterbournes**. Postcard from Binley

I now have a crick in my neck having spent the last month gazing upwards in a vain attempt at spotting the White-Tailed Sea Eagle that was reported on local social media as having attempted to abduct a pet turkey from a garden in Stoke. It occurred to me that over the years there have been occasions when my Christmas dinner has ended up in the bin or in the dog, but never up in the sky, so that would have been a first. Fortunately for the turkey a child ran out of the house and fended the attacker off, an act of heroism that surely deserves some recognition because these are very big birds with a wingspan of eight feet! But the story is not as far-fetched as you might imagine. The first of these reintroduced birds were released on the Isle of Wight in 2019. I think the original idea was they would spread along the south coast but being nomadic they have also moved inland with some going up as far as Scotland or west to Exmoor and Wales with another pair spending a great deal of time in Suffolk. Others make daily forays into Hampshire and back to the island. Perhaps it was one of these "commuters" that passed over Stoke and fancied his chances? Either way I think it top trumps the Osprey spotted in Longparish recently.

But I have been thinking about these reintroduced creatures and the success or failure of them. We can all remember the reintroduction of Great Bustards on to Salisbury Plain in recent years but that got off to a tricky start because they used Russian Bustards who came over, had a good time and then went back to Russia as Russians are prone to do. The Bustards! So next they went for the more laid-back Spanish Bustards who were far more accommodating, strolling around (even at Stonehenge!), having a louche time, taking afternoon naps and everything was "mañana". And they have been a huge success and probably down to the fact that they can outrun a fox.

So, ospreys, beavers, natterjack toads, wild boar, sand lizards, pine martens, even the Capercaillie, the first ever reintroduced creature back in 1832, have all flourished though the latter's numbers are down by 40% in the last 15 years due to habitat loss. So how far do you go? Step forward Paul Lister, owner of the 20,000-hectare Alladale Estate in Sutherland who in 2013 attempted to create a true Highland wilderness reserve with the reintroduction of wolves and bears. Needless to say, the Ramblers Association blew a gasket as the right to roam legislation allows all access to land north of the border, and I kind of take their point, though as someone who has occasionally tried to remove the odd poaching Glaswegian character from the riverbank, I'm not sure what I'd be more frightened of!

Lastly my thoughts and prayers with the family of Robert Mew, resident of Binley, a real country man in every sense of the word and a thoroughly nice and honourable chap. He will be missed.

Remembrance Sunday and Armistice Day Lecture 2024

Some two hundred people congregated around the War Memorial on Remembrance Sunday to remember the dead of both World Wars and other conflicts. Wreaths were laid by Deputy Lieutenant Professor Khalid Aziz LVO on behalf of the Lord Lieutenant of Hampshire, and Colonel (retd) Charlie Blount, St Mary Bourne's senior officer. The Royal British Legion contingent numbered seventeen. Petty Officer (retd) Danny Anderson, replete with pace stick, kept the squad in step. Colonel Blount recited "The Exhortation" and Lieutenant (RN retd) James Croser read the Roll of Honour and the "Kohima Epitaph". Major (retd) Michael Malyon read "In Flanders Fields". The Reverend Canon Dodie Marsden conducted the service at The War Memorial and afterwards at St Peter's Church.

The following day, Armistice Day, some 120 people gathered in the village hall for a lecture on D-Day, in recognition of its 80th anniversary. Amongst the attendees

was a D-Day veteran, St Mary Bourne resident Gordon Pearce, aged 103, who landed on Gold Beach with the 8th Armoured Brigade on D+3. The lecture was arranged by Captain (retd)



Jeremy Barkes and the serving and veteran community of St Mary Bourne. The speaker was Brigadier (retd) Allan Mallinson, a former commanding officer of 13th/18th Royal Hussars, whose tanks swam ashore on Sword Beach on D-Day. He is a best-selling author of military history and of a series of novels about a nineteenth century cavalry officer, Matthew Hervey. His latest book, "The Shape of Battle", analyses six battles in depth, of which one is D-Day. He is also the military obituarist for The Times. His talk focused on the meticulous planning of D-Day and the people behind it. It offered a fascinating perspective by an acknowledged expert and was extremely well received.

The lecture made a net profit of £1,214 mostly from ticket sales but also from a pay bar. Of this, £850 was added to funds raised in St Mary Bourne on behalf of The Poppy Appeal and the balance of £364 was donated to St Peter's Church. The total contribution by St Mary Bourne to The Poppy Appeal amounted to £2,301. The coordinator of the Poppy Appeal in St Mary Bourne is Michael Malyon. On behalf of the Royal British Legion, the serving and veteran community wish to thank all those who supported the Appeal.

It is intended to hold another Armistice Day Lecture next year. A Royal Naval subject has been mooted. JВ
