

## Message from the Area Dean

Across our enlarged Benefice of Bright Waters, the Clergy team have been considering how we might helpfully engage more with families and children, especially where our churches have close links with schools.

We are working with the PCCs to enhance our worship by sensitively introducing new forms of audio visual technology and also creative forms of all age liturgy and prayers in our services. For example, when all of our churches gather at once for a Benefice service, as we will at St Peter's on Sunday 31<sup>st</sup> July this year, we will aim to start with 'café church' beginning with refreshments and hospitality and then move to an informal all age service.

Current forms of liturgy are not being replaced, they will remain with seasonal materials, as they are complimented by 'Morning Praise' and 'Communion Praise' services that are more relaxed and for all ages with hymns, songs, prayers and a short talk.

I am aware it will take time to build confidence in service structures, and thank you for your patience, our vision moving forward, as we care for our present congregations, is also to helpfully welcome as many new people to our beautiful buildings as we can.

#### Dear Friends,

Some of my earliest memories from my Church of England primary school in London were assemblies – often based on the life of one of the saints. I can still remember how I would listen with attention to the stories that our teachers or parish priest would tell us – the good deeds that these people had done. The stories were always exciting and seemed to come from a more colourful time with the fight between good and evil played out as if in a colourful storybook.

And this interest of mine has continued. Some of these stories are amusing and improbable – from St. Fillan of Munster, who read by the light of his miraculously glowing arm, to St Dominic of the Causeway who brought a roast chicken back to life!

Of course, the more normal lives of the saints that we read at school were intended to give us examples of what it is to be a Christian. We often had stories of more modern "saints", like Dr Barnardo or Mother Teresa – all of them showing us through their lives what it is to live out our Christian vocations. The trouble with many of these examples is that their lives were sometimes so good, that it could seem that too high a bar had been set for us. How could we possibly live up to their example?

On 29<sup>th</sup> June, St. Peter's Day in 2013, I was ordained priest. I have a soft spot for St. Peter – not only because he is the patron of one of the churches in our Benefice, but also because of his human frailty. You will remember what Jesus said to Peter: "You are Peter, and on this rock I will build my Church" (Matthew 16:18).

Jesus sets out a huge expectation for Peter to live up to – and we know that Peter did go on to live, and die, as a disciple of Jesus. But we also know Peter had great failings - Peter could be impulsive and short tempered. He was prone to opening his mouth before thinking and he was rebuked by Jesus a few times for this. He could be cowardly and because of this he denied even knowing Jesus three times. For me, the fact that such a human person as Peter could go on to be such a great disciple and be the foundation of the Church gives me great hope. Despite my human failings, God is confident that I can live up to what he expects of me and calls me to do.

So now, when I read the life of a saint, I look first not for their most holy attributes, but for their more human failings. That is what gives me hope. Blessings, Richard

There are plenty of people in our communities who wish to support, in many different ways, refugees who may be making their way here due to the war in Ukraine. Below are some resources and ideas we can share with you.

#### • Hosting a Ukrainian Family

If you would like to find out more there is a meeting at St Mary's Church, Overton, 3<sup>rd</sup> May, 7.30pm – this is for those locally who are hoping to host a family or to volunteer in some other way. #### • Volunteering Support in Other Ways

It will be good to locally coordinate matching offers of help to the people who need them eg: if someone is hosting a family with a baby and needs to find a cot, or needs an extra set of pots and pans or if someone can help with lifts to appointments. Please get in touch with one of the clergy if you would like to help; (email addresses are opposite under Services). <u>Winchester City of Sanctuary</u> - an umbrella site which has links to other groups supporting refugees in the local area. They are also building a list of Meeting Spaces for refugees in Winchester, the first of which is the United Church on Jewry Street which is open Saturday mornings 10am to 12noon as a place for refugees to build community.

Test Valley Borough Council - are working with their partner Unity to coordinate those with particular skills or services they can offer to Ukrainian refugees, they are particularly interested in Ukraine nationals already living in the area. Dear all,

Hope you all enjoyed the sunny Easter weekend!

I joined the practice as a partner in December 2021 after completing my training, replacing Dr Rose following his retirement last spring. My generation was the first of GPs to have evolved during the pandemic, to spearhead growing the digital aspect of general practice and the idea of 'care navigation' which follows the concept of 'Right Patient, Right Problem, Right Clinician, Right Place, Right time'. This has developed because despite government pledges to increase doctor numbers, there has been a loss in number of GPs but boom in healthcare demand and so direct access to alternative professions is now being provided at the front door of healthcare, to fill the gap and reduce waiting times. While this future will face resistance from advocates of the traditional 'sit and wait' to see your GP, it is a future coming from necessity rather than our choice.

There are many great benefits, however; for example, physiotherapists offered now for free in practice will manage the overwhelming majority of muscle and joint pains and they are better trained than GPs in their speciality, having undertaken at least a 4-year MSc just in their area. Our reception or clinicians will suggest you see them first because it will be the initial step in treatment most of us will suggest if you saw us first - why wait?

The overwhelming benefit of this is that when you have a sick child, complex breathing difficulties or struggling kidneys, the GP can see you faster, depending on the severity of your issue, and will actively pull you towards them and will have longer with you. Importantly, this is a more sustainable health service based on our population's need.

This will become clearer on our new website launching soon.

## Platinum Jubilee Celebrations in St Mary Bourne

We have been working on our initial ideas and here is an outline of what we are organising to celebrate this historic royal first:

• Thursday 2<sup>nd</sup> June: Jubilee Beacon. Meet at 8.45pm on the Rec in St Mary Bourne to form a torch-lit procession up to Spring Hill Wild Camping site where we will be lighting a beacon at 9.45pm as one of the jubilee beacons being lit at the same time right across the Commonwealth. There will be no parking on site so anyone who needs assistance getting to and from the camp site should email **karencrofts@hotmail.com** or call or message **07990 514969** so we can arrange transport as we do not want anyone who wants to be there to miss out. Please do not bring dogs, fireworks or sparklers.

• Friday 3<sup>rd</sup> June: Sports afternoon. An afternoon of fun and games from 2pm on the Rec in St Mary Bourne to include cricket games for children in appropriate age groups, rounders and tug-of-war for all ages with refreshments and prizes.

• Saturday 4<sup>th</sup> June: Whole village photo, parish cycle ride, jubilee display and evening drinks. We want to try to get as many people as we can onto the recreation ground at 11am to be part of a suitably formed (probably in the shape of '70') celebratory photo that will be taken by a drone. It will only take half an hour of your day so please come and encourage your neighbours to do so too.

All the family can join in the **cycling routes** around the parish which will start and finish on the Rec in St Mary Bourne. There will be refreshment stops along the route and afternoon tea in the Village Centre at the finish.

The Village Centre will feature a **jubilee display** of royal memorabilia from the last 70 years along with entries for the children's jubilee competitions and photos of the best decorated home competition (details of these competitions will be produced shortly). Children will also be able to have an audience with our own queen and receive a personalised certificate as a memento of the jubilee. **Drinks & nibbles** will be available and we will have a playlist of music from the last 70 years and check in on the Platinum Party at the Palace being screened by the BBC.

• Sunday 5<sup>th</sup> June: Church service and the Big Jubilee Lunch. There will be a service of

**celebration** in St Peter's (or, weather permitting, in the churchyard) at 10.30am and all weekend there will be a flower festival and penny and quiz trails to enjoy.

At 1pm we will come together on the Rec for a **jubilee lunch**. The idea is that everyone brings some food and puts it out on the tables for all to share. You will need to bring your own chairs and whatever you would like to drink. We will have a **jubilee queen** for each decade of the Queen's reign (details to be announced), games and entertainment for children (and adults!), dance displays and presentation of prizes. We will also dedicate our **jubilee tree** and the celebrations will be rounded off with a special **bell ringing** from 19:52 to 20:22 to signify the 70 years. 

I'm not going to talk about the shop in its present form this month. There is a far more exciting thing to discuss! You may have heard about the shop's plans to expand so I thought I'd fill you in on its ethos and what it's all about. We are opening up Share Offers this month so here is what it's all about...

This idea of a café to join the shop was born over 3 years ago... it certainly cannot be accused of being

a flash in the pan! During these last 3 years we first had to establish that the shop on its own was a sustainable entity and that its future was secure. We then had to think about whether the community actually wanted a café and if it did, whether the shop was the best place to put it; plan and design its layout (ensuring all trees were accounted for), to get a group of people with the right skill sets and enthusiasm to join our team, get planning permission and finally... where we are now... To raise the funds. It's been a long journey so far, but in fact the hardest bit is still to come. Making our vision, your vision, reality. We have embarked on a massive project. It has taken, and will continue to take hard work, determination and a good measure of frustration... so why bother?

Apart from the obvious convenience of having a fantastic café attached to a really good shop within walking distance for many or a short drive for some, there are a huge range of benefits.

The shop on its own has gone as far as it can within its existing walls. We are bursting at the seams and need more space to give the community a wider range of products including selling items with zero packaging and from more local producers all the while extending and continuing our range of everyday items. Through surveys and word of mouth we have ascertained that the addition of a café to the shop would be hugely popular within the village and surrounding areas and if we're going to do it... let's do it really well!

I am a true believer that a village shop (and the café attached) is bigger than the sum of its parts. It's not only there as a convenience when you run out of bread or milk, or if you want to grab a latte.

It's also a hub of a community. It's a place where you have morning banter with those whom you live amongst when you collect your morning paper, or hot bacon sandwich.

It's a place to meet friends and chat over village life with really great tea or coffee and cake.

It's a place to find out what's happening in your area and local services on offer.

It's a place where young people can participate in work experience and get to know the older generation. It's a place where new people to the area can get to know more people and make friends.

A proper village shop and café has heart. And this shop and café will have the community at its heart. It will know when Phyliss, who was 90 this year hasn't been in for a while and will go and knock on her door to make sure everything is OK. recycling collection box is back in the

church again. Look for a labelled wooden tray on the square table on the right when you enter by the main door.

St Mary Bourne School are also going to help by collecting them this term. I will be taking them on to the local Terracycle centre at the Rising Fives in Whitchurch. All biros, felt tips, highlighters, correction fluidpots and tape, mechanical pencils and eraser pens are recyclable and sponsored by BIC. They cannot



accept glue sticks, rubbers or rulers as these damage the machines.

**Beauty products** are another popular item to be sponsored. Andover Superdrug, sponsored by Mabelline, will recycle all plastic make up containers except nail varnish, aerosols and brushes. There is a box at the back of their shop. Andover Boots will take all plastic beauty, health and dental products and has a reward scheme giving advantage points if you register. Look for the green bin. The Body Shop has been recycling for years and now concentrates on the hard-to-recycle packaging such as mascaras, lip glosses, pumps, pipettes, pouches and tiny bottles less than 50ml, but not perfume bottles. All empty and clean of course.

Terracycle collections go on at Whitchurch, as before, at 16 Queens Road; and check the Sustainable Bourne Valley website <u>http://www.sustainablebournevalley.org.uk/</u>.

Just to say they no longer take crisp packets which are now classed as soft plastics so can go with the carrier bags etc. (see last month's magazine). Vernham Dean is pausing Terracycle collections for now due to family circumstances.



# Tackling the species invading our chalk streams

Around 10,000 years ago, a land bridge connected Britain to what is now mainland Europe. The end of the Ice Age allowed wildlife to cross, until rising sea levels formed the English Channel. All the plants and animals that were present at this point are now classified as native species.

Non-native species, by contrast, are those that have been transported outside their natural range by human activity. This isn't always a bad thing – sheep originated near the Caspian Sea and the apple tree comes from Kazakhstan, but neither poses a problem for native wildlife.

When a species negatively impacts the environment, the economy, or human health, however, then it is classified as invasive. These species might hunt native ones, or out-compete them for food and habitat. They might carry new diseases or have the ability to hybridise.

This impact is a top cause of worldwide biodiversity loss, and costs our economy  $\pounds$ 1.7 billion each year. Our precious chalk streams - globally rare havens for many endangered species - are badly affected by invasives like Himalayan balsam, American mink, and signal crayfish.

Invasive Species Week (16-22 May this year) reminds us that this remains a pressing issue. But we can help to tackle it all year round, with a few simple actions:

- Some species can survive long periods out of water and may hitch a ride on your damp clothes or equipment, so follow the 'check, clean, dry' procedure.
- Plants are natural escape artists, so choose local species for your garden or take steps to stop nonnative ones from 'jumping the fence'.
- There are websites and apps for recording species sightings, so let them know even if you're not completely sure what you've seen.

## Postcard from Binley - May 2022

Those of us that live under straw do so knowing the inherent dangers, but nothing could have prepared us as a community for the devastating fire here in the village last month. Our hearts go out to the family concerned. I personally found it very difficult as we had moved in to the village on the same day all those years ago. We had made homes for ourselves and raised children who had become friends. The emotional damage must be as bad as the material one. I know I speak for everyone here in Binley when I say we are here to give unconditional help, love and support.

The daffs have been and gone. I'm not going to say anymore on that subject because I've rambled on about them these last two years and I'm fearful of becoming a daffodil bore, which is only one level below a golf bore, the pinnacle of boorishness. Already one wag in the village refers to me as "Wordsworth" and it's the same individual who, when I first turned up at the Hurdlers Arms 37 years ago driving a red Porsche 911 named me "Postman Pat". So he has form. What I do find rather touching though is the number of elderly couples who still make an annual pilgrimage to Binley at this time of year despite the gardens no longer opening. They park up on the verge and sometimes wander down the lane hand in hand. With the lambs gambolling to their left, the daffs swaying to their right and spring sunlight filtering down through the leaves above it's a scene rather reminiscent of a "Pure Cremation" advert or one of those other ghastly funeral plan jobs we are bombarded with nowadays. I must admit I did chuckle at the one running on Sky News at present selling a funeral plan from a company called "Dead Happy"! Gallows humour at it's finest!

But Spring is springing out all over. My home office juts out in to the garden and I am surrounded by nature at its most industrious. Everywhere I look there is nest building, young being fed, Bumble Bees bumbling and pigeons..... well, you know what they are doing. I wouldn't mind but they make such a racket doing it and it offends my delicate ears. It puts me in mind of a time when I lived in a flat in West London with paper thin walls and ceilings. The woman above me would entertain gentleman friends well into the early hours, I think on a commercial basis, and was terribly vocal. Frustrated and unable to sleep I would eventually crack and scream "He can't be that b\*\*\*\*y good!" Sadly, this only encouraged her. Some people have no shame.

Coming over the top by Woodcott church the other day, I came across four brace of partridges taking a dust bath in the middle of the road. It was a warm spring afternoon and they preened and contorted themselves into odd positions, a leg stuck out here, a wing there. It was quite comical to watch as they kicked and flicked the gravel in the air; but as soon as they sensed my presence, off they trooped in a sulk as partridges are inclined to do. And the fallow deer are back. Tony Duddington saw a herd of about thirty in Egbury, and here in Binley I watched five bucks and three does enjoying Jeff Harrison's roses! The bucks are large and

quite magnificent, and it is always a heart stopping moment when you come across them. By the time you get to read this the females will be giving birth to young. The first few weeks are perilous as the young are very frail and unable to keep up with the herd. As such they are hidden by the mother amongst vegetation and cover. She will not be far away and remains vigilant however. It is easy if you are out on a ramble and come across one to assume it has been abandoned or orphaned. This is very much not the case, and it is imperative that dogs are controlled, and the animal is not touched and left alone. She will return. The same could be applied to leverets (young hares) who you may stumble across tucked into forms (scrapes). They may be left on their own all day until dusk when the mother returns to feed them. But they are safe, or as safe as they can be. Having said all that, the decline in numbers of hares from last year here in Binley alarms me greatly. This spring I have not seen anything like the numbers of last year and one worries about fox predation or a reoccurrence of the awful myxoma-type virus. The hare is a noble animal that has inspired a rich vein of folklore and poetry. I do hope they will prevail.

You know when sometimes you do someone a favour and it backfires on you? So, I was passing through Stoke and there is a little colony of collared doves that live in the middle of the village. You'll often see them by the crossroads pecking around. Well, I came across this little fellow sitting in the middle of the highway and not budging. I got out of the car and went over to him, but he was unsteady on his feet and looked a little bewildered as so many Stoke residents do (Just kidding!!! Just kidding!!!). He didn't appear damaged, so I picked him up and popped him on the grass verge by Bag End. As I got back in my car, I looked back at him and all I saw was a cloud of feathers! Some raptor of sorts had obliterated the poor chap. Ruined my day. *NA*



We are lucky to have so many businesses in Longparish, selling everything from groceries, newspapers, beer, wine, meals, venison, gin, to takeaways, repairing lawnmowers and much more. They have survived the pandemic and have been invaluable during the last two years. Longparish is hugely grateful to the service they provide to our community. Now more than ever we must support our local businesses.

Here are some reasons why we should think big, by shopping locally.

## 1. Good for the planet

Instead of ordering online, and having it shipped across the world, or travelling to shop, look for it locally! Reducing our environmental impact, while increasing our community impact.

**3. Local business owners invest in the community.** By shopping at the small business around the corner, we indirectly make an investment towards the enhancement of the community.

The number of cards counted will be sent for a calculation as to how much energy and money Longparish can save if we undertake to change our behaviour in just small ways.

**Phase 2** will be exploring what you can do to can retrofit your home and looking at using Nature to benefit the biodiversity in the village. This Phase will be supported by The Sustainability Centre and the Hampshire and Isle of Wight Wildlife Trust.

## LONGPARISH WILDLIFE By Chris Bowman

#### THE TOAD

Common toads vary from dark brown, grey-olive green to sandy coloured. They have broad, squat bodies and warty skin. They tend to walk rather than hop. Toads are widespread and common in the mainland Britain.

Common toads excavate a shallow burrow that they return to after foraging for food. They secrete an irritant substance from their skin and puff themselves to deter predators. Toads tend to live away from water, except when mating. During the winter months they hibernate in deep leaf litter, log piles and burrows. During mating the male clutches the female from behind in a tight embrace. He then fertilises the long triple-stranded string of eggs as she lays them among the water weed. Tadpoles hatch after 10 days and gradually change completely into toadlets over 2-3 months. Common toads can live up to 10-12 years. Their food is insect larve, spiders, slugs and worms.



All the local toads would like to thank all the people who helped them across the road this year.

I saw my first Swallow on the 29th March;10 days earlier than last year. As of the 18th April I've not seen a House Martin or heard the Cuckoo.

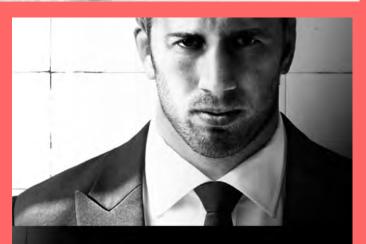

This is a testament to all the hard work our team of Mill Hosts have put into making the café a go-to destination for locals as well as providing appealing refreshments for the Mill's visitors. The other nominees will be stiff competition but we're happy to be in their classy company: Manchester Jewish Museum, English Heritage's Stonehenge café, Kiplin Hall in Yorkshire and the Black Watch Castle and Museum. The winner will be announced at a ceremony on 11 May and some of our team will attend.

## A Real Buzz around the Mill

- In February we had 1530 paid admissions, 540 free visitors (using Friends Membership or Annual Passes) and 734 solely café users. In total these visitors spent nearly £16,000 in the café and we served them 2,804 drinks!
- Whitchurch Silk now makes up over 40% of shop sales and we're selling a scarf nearly every day; a really rewarding result of the hard work of our weavers in designing new product, and making it beautifully.




