

## Hearing the right call

I have just spent an hour standing outside in the wind, (although the sun did make intermittent appearances) doing what I can only describe as wasting my time or more kindly caring for creation.

I was in my garden and I heard the distinct and close sound of a mother duck in great distress. We are fortunate to live near a chalk stream - the Bourne rivulet and tributary to the Test - so hearing ducks was not unusual in itself. But this duck was persistent in using the one distinct call over and over again.

On investigation, it was a duck who had nested and hatched four ducklings not far from our house; and she was identifiable, in that her plumage had a slight blue tinge and, joy of joys, she had a blonde duckling. We watched this family daily and were part of the traffic control, because she had to take her family up the banks of the rivulet across the road and down the other side, as the water levels were too high and they could not pass under the bridge.

Today however it was evident she had lost her family and she was patrolling up and down the water calling out to the missing youngster. She must have swum against the strong current at least ten times as I stood transfixed at her determination. Eventually one duckling appeared from the long grass, but as she made her way towards the errant youngster the current carried him past her and by the time she changed direction, I watched the little one disappear in the long grass. She called and called but to no avail. I observed that whenever she got close and went into the grass, the duckling popped out and went past on the outside of the grass island and so they kept missing each other.

Eventually I could stand it no longer (literally) and came inside hoping they would find each other before dusk.

Now what, you might ask, has this got to do with me as a trainee curate soon to be ordained Priest? Simply put, I marvelled at the mother's earnest call and the duckling's inattention, and I wondered if I had been like that duckling, ignoring what turned out to be a very persistent call to ministry?

My dear friend in Chester kept telling me to consider the possibility that I should follow the call to ministry because she felt strongly this was what God wanted. She was my priest and also belonged to the Chester Ordinand programme and so was skilled and trained in the discovery and training of new ordinands.

The number of times I did not heed her guidance and instead listened to all the other voices around me saying 'but aren't you too old, do you really want to start studying again, what will your husband say if your head is in books and not the kitchen'. And worse of all I listened to my inner voice which insisted 'this was nonsense and just my pride wanting to stand out amongst my peers' and so on. Of course, nearly three years down the road, I realise the negative voices were nothing less than the 'fallen one' who did not want the church to have another strong believer in the midst of the world's general chaos and trouble.

Thank goodness I could hear the positive voices amongst the noise, which for a while was all I could hear. My journey through training and learning and assignments has at times been very hard, but I am so thankful to the wonderful peer group I belong to, the ministry team I now am part of, who offer support and encouragement, to my tutors, and most importantly to my Training Incumbent who has been generous with his time, experience and advice.

The poor little duckling could not hear mum because of the surrounding noise of rushing water, wind, and other ducks and drakes trying to keep her off-track. But for me, I heard a voice eventually so clear in my head, it bore no resemblance to any I had heard before. So I knew it must be God and you cannot ignore him as he will find a way to make you listen.





## Continuing our sunny summer ride up the

## B3048

## Highway to the North - Part 5

'There is not in this wide world a valley so sweet, / As that vale in whose bosom the bright waters meet.' Tom Moore (1779-1852). The Irish writer and poet was not describing the Bourne/Test, though it was generous of another Irish writer to appropriate his words for the local confluence. Harry Plunket Greene is arguably the most internationally celebrated resident along the B3048 (as extended in 1935), certainly the most famous singer, flyfisherman and book-author (assuming James Blunt's accomplishments do not include the latter two). He only lived at the Long House, Hurstbourne Priors, for eleven years, 1902-13 (though, admittedly, is now a long-term resident of the churchyard). His fly-fishing classic, Where the Bright Waters Meet (1924), ends rather dejectedly, lamenting the effect of the poisonous runoff from the recent tarring of the roads on the wild trout population. His proposed solution was to strip off the tar road surface for half-a-mile each side of the river. This did not catch the popular fancy, though the epidemic of potholes is taking us in his direction.

The historical roots in Hurstbourne Priors north go very deep. St Andrew's is the oldest church foundation of those along this road, consecrated in 802. What you see now is mainly late Victorian, however, with a few Norman touches. But its glory is the magnificent Oxenbridge tomb of the 1570s. The organ of 1906 was commissioned by Sir Hubert Parry ('Jerusalem') and later played by Sibelius! Houses run along the left for a third of a mile, tucked among them the School House (the school of 1855-1969), the Village Hall (1909), the Old Parsonage. On the right is the cricket field then the church. The extensive Hurstbourne Park estate climbs the hill behind, seat of the Wallops, earls of Portsmouth, for some 300 years.

The road runs up two-thirds of a mile from what had been a direct crossroads, now a staggered junction, to the first bridge on the journey so far. It is a distinctive iron bridge, though not designed by Brunel. Its railings are white-painted iron, held up by graceless concrete girders, a rebuilding of the 1859 four-arch brick construction, no doubt built for the convenience of the visitor to Hurstbourne House (1778), leading as it does to the main gate. So, for now, the river runs on the west, as the road clings to the side of a steep bank, Spratt's Down, to the right.

Soon comes Chapmansford crossroads, the Hurstbourne railway viaduct dominating the view over the water meadow and river channels. Here we cross the very ancient path of the Kent-Devon Harroway, trodden by céapmenn (Old English for merchants, mongers) from time immemorial. The traffic at this junction has been increasing over recent years, but we have right of way, as we head north towards St Mary Bourne.

## RECREATION GROUND BINS

espite repeated requests from the Parish Council, Basingstoke & Deane Borough Council have refused to provide us with dog waste bins in the village and specifically on the recreation ground and at the entrance to the gallops footpath.

The Parish Council therefore please ask all dog owners to put bagged dog poo into the wheelie bin by the Recreation Ground gate and NOT into the rubbish bins around the ground. These rubbish bins are emptied by members of the Parish, and it is not fair for them to have to empty bins full of dog poo.

Please can dog walkers take home their bagged dog waste if they use the public footpath across the gallops – there isn't a dog poo fairy who comes and collects bags left hanging on the fences and gates. In addition, these bags are a danger to the horses that use the gallops.

We have been told that if the Parish Council can prove that there is a need for a waste bin by the bus shelter (for the gallops) we might be able to be allocated one – at our expense. Therefore, if you see rubbish left in the bus shelter, or abandoned dog poo bags in the vicinity, please can you take a photograph and send it by email to the Parish Clerk on richard.waterman150@btinternet.com. The Parish Council will then put together another application which is totally evidence based. Typically, the council came to assess our need the Monday after we had done the village clean-up!

The largest plant so far is a single thistle plant standing proud above the long grasses. It has many buds so should be quite spectacular when it is in bloom.

## RECIPE(S) OF THE MONTH(S)

The cry goes out along the valley, clear as the thwack of a tennis ball hitting a racquet on Centre Court: strawberry season is upon us! Perhaps you grow your own, perhaps you have been hot-footing it to the St Mary Bourne PYO, or perhaps you've been forming an orderly queue in a supermarket; however you get your hands on them, July is a month traditionally awash with strawberries. My semi-feral children have been plundering wild strawberries from the garden for the last few weeks - which is charming and idyllic on the one hand, and downright alarming on the other, as the baby now thinks anything red and shiny has the potential to be a delicious strawberry. Turns out, there are plenty of shiny red things you definitely shouldn't eat, but good luck explaining that to a determined one year old with a piece of red Lego in her sights.

Anyway, back to the strawberries. There are plenty of things you can do with them, but with an eye on next year's May Fair, here is a recipe for that stalwart of the Deli Stall, good old strawberry jam.

To make roughly four jars

1kg fresh strawberries, washed and hulled 1kg jam sugar 1 lemon, juice only

Hill & Valley

- Cut larger strawberries in half. Put the strawberries and lemon juice into a large pan. Heat gently to soften, add the sugar and stir over a low heat until the sugar has dissolved.
- Once the sugar has dissolved and the liquid is clear, boil steadily for about 6 minutes, or until at setting point. To test if the jam is at setting point, spoon a little onto a cold plate, leave for a minute and then push the jam with your finger. If the jam wrinkles and separates without flooding back, setting point has been reached.
- Set aside to cool for 10 minutes. Spoon into sterilised jars, label and seal with wax paper and a lid.

If, even after you've made your strawberry jam, your glut of strawberries looks set to continue into August, (this is the July/August edition, after all) or if you just need a drink after making all that jam, you might like to try this easy recipe for a Rossini cocktail, the strawberry cousin to the more usual Bellini

To make roughly six glasses

500g strawberries, hulled 2 tbsp crème de fraise (optional) 1 bottle of Prosecco

 Simply puree the strawberries with the crème de fraise, add a spoon or two of icing sugar to taste, if required, and add to the Prosecco. Stir well and serve.






It's the Animal Service and we are hoping to celebrate with our pets but also give special thanks for all our woodland animals

At the end of July two of our most experienced and well-loved Teaching Assistants are retiring. Between them they have given forty-eight years of service to the school.

Mrs Pam Hicks joined the staff in 1995, her son James was six years old, and she thought she might stay a few years before moving on to something else. Mrs Helen Little arrived in 2005 and as a parent of three young children found the school routine, work, terms and holidays suited her well. Both have worked in KS 1 and KS 2, thus helping with children aged from 4 through to 11. A wonderful 29 and 19 years respectively; caring for, teaching, instructing, helping and educating many year groups meaning that over five hundred children passed through their care.

So, they were asked what they had done, what they had enjoyed and what had happened in those years. The school had had four heads and two interim heads during that time, two additional classrooms had been built along with a library. The kitchen had been closed by HCC and reopened, the office was upstairs and then downstairs. Both had led after-school clubs and worked in all five

They noted that in the early years very few dads were seen in the playground, the children lined up at the beginning of the day to go into school and they both loved the opportunity to really get to know the children when they were away on their residential week.

Now it is time to say goodbye. And as we do, we want them both to know of our gratitude and thanks for all they have done for so many of our children. So, in looking at all the above,

what has been done, what has been achieved, how the school has adapted and changed over these years and with so many more experiences and events - all of which Mrs Hicks and Mrs Little have been involved in, we want them to know we are deeply grateful. Thank you, Mrs Hicks, and thank you Mrs Little, thank you so much. We wish you both a happy retirement.



### **Summer Activity: Write a Chalk Stream Poem**

With their captivating beauty and incredible wildlife, our local chalk streams are great places to find inspiration. As we head into summer, it's the perfect time to try creative writing by penning a poem! If you can, visit a public stretch of stream and look for a quiet place where you can explore

with all your senses.



Study the stream with your eyes - what shapes and colours can you see? Notice how the water moves, and how the plants sway in the wind. If there are animals around, what are they doing?

Investigate textures - what do the plant leaves feel like? Try gently touching soil, grass, or pebbles. If you can safely reach the water, how does it feel on your fingers?

Take in the sounds of the stream - can you hear birds chirping, people talking, water flowing, or wind blowing? What sound does the ground make when you step on it? Pay attention to the scents in the air - if there are flowers on the stream banks, what do they smell like? You could even catch a whiff of the water on a hot day, or the soil after heavy rain.

Next, use your imagination. Put yourself in the place of a chalk stream animal - what might its life be like? Pretend that you're interviewing the stream and ask it to describe the world around it. Think about the people who visited 100 years ago, and what they could have been doing there. How might the stream be different 100 years from now?

When you're ready to start writing, choose a word that you want to use and think of other words with a similar meaning (synonyms). How do these words change the tone or meaning of your poem? You could also use words that start with the same sound (alliteration), contain similar sounds (assonance), or describe noises like "splash" or "buzz" (onomatopoeia).

Have a go at crafting a metaphor (when one thing "is" another), simile (when one thing is "like" another), or juxtaposition (how things are different from each other). Play around with your poem's structure (form), rhythm (metre), or rhyming pattern (if it has one), Before you know it, you'll have your very own piece of amazing nature

## **Summer pudding recipe**

You will need:

750 grams mixed fruits (raspberries, currants, chopped strawberries etc)
150 grams sugar
I loaf thick white sliced bread (slightly stale)

### Method

Heat the berries with the sugar and 3 tablespoons of water until softened.

Meanwhile, cut the crusts off the bread and line a 2pint pudding basin with the bread slices. There should be no gaps and it doesn't matter if the slices are not all the same size.

When the fruit has cooled a little, pour it into the pudding basin on top of the bread. Then cover the top with bread, leaving no gaps. If there is some fruit left over, keep it to cover the pudding when you turn it out.

Put a weight on the pudding and leave overnight so the bread can soak up the juices.

When ready to serve, put your serving dish over the pudding and turn it upside down and give it a firm shake. The pudding should be red all over but there may be some white areas which you can paint with your spare juice. Serve with cream or crème frais.

## Interesting history about July and August

July is named after Roman dictator Julius
Caesar (100 B.C.—44 B.C.). Caesar developed the
precursor to the Gregorian calendar we use today.
July 1 is Canada Day, a Canadian federal holiday that
celebrates the creation of the Dominion of Canada in
1867. July 3 brings the start of the hot and sultry Dog
Days of Summer! The dog days or dog days of
summer are the hot, sultry days of summer. They
were historically the period following the heliacal
rising of the star system Sirius, the 'Dog Star'.

The month of **August** was originally named Sextilis in Latin because it was the 6th month in the original ten-month Roman Calander under Romulus in 753 BC. In 8 BC, the month was renamed in honour of Emperor Augustus. According to a Senatus consultum quoted by Macrobius, he chose this month because it was the time of several of his great triumphs, including the conquest of Egypt. Commonly repeated lore has it that August has 31 days because Augustus wanted his month to match the length of Julius Caesar's July, but this is an invention of the 13th century scholar Johannes de Sacrobosco. Sextilis in fact had 31 days before it was renamed, and it was not chosen for its length.

Also recyclable here is Polystyrene or Styrofoam, but it needs to be bagged separately. Open to the public for drop off Mondays to Fridays 8.30am to 4.30 pm but check first by telephone 01264 771519.

## 2. B&D BC advice on recycling is as follows:

#### Plastic bottles

These can be recycled in your green recycling bin. Please ensure they are empty and clean. Lids can now be left on, but bottles MUST BE WASHED AND SQUASHED first. Loose lids should be put in your grey waste bin.

### Plastic carrier bags


We recommend residents use a Bag for Life, which are available from supermarkets. These are a durable option which helps reduce the amount of rubbish you produce. They are also often replaced free of charge when they are no longer suitable for use. Reusing plastic carrier bags and saying no to unnecessary bags (SNUB) will also help. Plastic carrier bags can be recycled at most major supermarket chains including Sainsbury's, Morrisons, Tesco. Alternatively, they can be placed in your grey waste bin.

#### Plastic food trays

Please place in your grey waste bin. This will be sent to the Energy Recovery Facility (ERF) to produce electricity, which is fed back to the national grid and is still the best option, environmentally, for non-recyclable waste.

#### **REPORT FROM PC MEETING ON 10 JUNE**

#### **PLANNING**

The Parish Council had NO OBJECTION to:

 Rear extension with French window and balcony at St Nicholas House

#### **COUNCIL MEMBERSHIP**

Mr Dave Harris (who is also the Parish Tree Warden) was co-opted onto the council at this meeting. Dave has agreed to look after Open Spaces & Footpaths alongside Peter Hull. The PC is also in the process of recruiting a replacement Clerk. The closing date for applications for the Clerk position was 14 June. Two councillor vacancies remain, and anyone interested in becoming a councillor should contact the clerk for more information. We welcome with open arms anyone who wants to get stuck into projects, is willing to join working parties, produce reports, monitor, and research, with the aim of making a difference for the good of the community.

#### **OPEN SPACES**

The PC has a new grass contractor following Clive's retirement at the end of March. With the winter being very mild, wet, and prolonged, together with the delay in engaging a new contractor, grass in the open spaces managed by the PC (particularly the cemetery) has become overly long, and the contractor is working towards getting this to a sensible level where it can be maintained more easily. The PC is monitoring this process closely.

#### **HIGHWAYS**

The pothole at Mill Lane has been repaired, however there are still issues relating to a broken pipe in the hedge line. Hampshire Highways are expected onsite to make an assessment, and once the river weed cutting has been completed, flooding in this area should improve. The PC is trying to determine the landowner responsible for a verge running alongside Sugar Lane, where overgrown saplings prevent the road from drying out properly and are also interfering with power lines. SSE and HCC have been contacted for advice, with neither currently accepting responsibility for management of the trees. Residents are requested to report (repeatedly if necessary) any road defects, or power outages, and the PC will continue to make enquiries about the ownership of the land. The Lengthsman has established that the pipe in the

direction of the sports field outside **The Withies** is broken but has been marked by Highways for repair. The Wait has been repaired, but the pipes have not yet been rodded, although this has been reported to HCC. The area around the **junction with Upper Mill** has been reviewed, and the Lengthsman is on stand-by to carry out remedial works; digging out the ditch down to the river, rodding, and clearing the gulley at the side of the road, once the water has drained away, if Hampshire Highways do not carry out this work beforehand.



## LONGPARISH WILDLIFE

The Goldcrest is our smallest bird along with its close relative the Firecrest. Goldcrests only weigh six grams or in old money 0.211 ounces. Plumage olive above and buff white below, with two white wing-bars. Black edged yellow, orange-centred crown and they have an exceedingly small black beak.

Nesting season starts in late April-early May. The nest is suspended on the end of a conifer branch usually Spruce, Fir, or Yew but I have found them in ivy. The nests are almost a spherical cup shape made of cobwebs and moss lined with hair and feathers. The cobwebs are used to form a link between twigs. Most small birds lay a lot of eggs because survival rates are low. The Goldcrest lays on average 9 to 11 buff white with exceptionally fine speckles of purplish or greyish brown eggs. They are incubated for 17-22 days which is long compared with other birds and fledged in another 17-22 days which is also longer. Goldcrests can only eat tiny insects, as well as, moth and butterfly eggs.



It has been a funny old year so far, the migrants overall were two weeks later than usual. People with nest boxes have been telling me the Tits only fledged one or two and some fledged none. The experts are saying the ones that nested incredibly early were fine but the later ones the parents had trouble finding enough food. It was not a good year for the oak tree moth caterpillars which many birds feed their chicks on plus the heavy rain washed them out of the trees, okay for ground feeding birds but not for the tree feeders.



## Water Quality in the River

As you have all experienced this winter it has been exceptionally wet and according to the EA Monthly Hydrology Report for the Solent and South Downs it's been the wettest 12 month period on record since 1871. Whilst it has been good to recharge the aquifer which feeds the Test and supplies Southern Water boreholes with a lot of local drinking water it also overwhelms the ancient sewage systems through our villages causing pollution as dilute wastewater enters the river system.



In the 2023 Rivers Report by the Test and Itchen Association, it quotes that spill performances from Southern Water worsened in 2023, even before the wet winter we have just come through. According to the data, the total hours of untreated sewage into the Test and Itchen Catchment amounted to 18,500 hours (770 days) in 1365 separate incidents, this is clearly unacceptable and probably

the biggest threat to our rivers. The last time Southern Water pumped sewage into the river directly at Middleton was in 2014 and 10 years on, things have not improved.

Even before the incidents over this past winter 14 farmers along the Upper Test, Bourne, Anton and Dever have got together, along with the Environmental Farmers Group (EFG) and Rothamsted Research, to sample the river on a weekly basis for Nitrates (N) and Phosphates (P). This will progress onto silt sampling and other pollutants. This partnership is mirroring one that has already been going for a year now on the Wylye in Wiltshire and is supporting farmers to test the river so they have their own independent data that can withstand scrutiny.

This data will then be used amongst the members of the group to pinpoint areas of pollution, speak to the party responsible for it, and help them stop it happening. It may well be the person is unaware it's even happening as it could be a septic tank that has broken or that run off from a field is making its way to the river causing a spike. By working together, these incidents can be reduced, and the water quality improved benefiting the whole river ecosystem. By being in control of our own data, we can sort these local issues out and then challenge the water company and the Environment Agency (EA) to deal with issues resulting from sewers and wastewater treatment works as we have the data to prove the incidents are happening.
